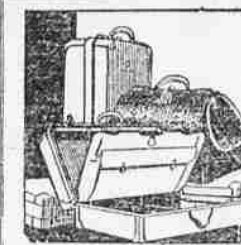

NOTE: The Total Crops referred to above are the entire yields from the reports selected, not that of the state. The number of reports sent in and from which these average results were made up, ranged from one to 176. The single statements were only in case of beans and turnips. There were two on loganberries, five on parsnips, 8 on tomatoes, 12 on cabbages, and all others were from 12 to 100 or more.
