

DENEEN GUEST OF COOLIDGE

Swampscott, Mass., July 30.—(A. P.)—Renewing his contact with congressional leaders, President Coolidge had as his guest at White Court today Senator Deneen of Illinois. The senator came into this locality primarily to deliver an address yesterday. After the return of Mr. Coolidge and his guest to White Court, Senator Butler of Massachusetts, chairman of the republican national committee, joined them. The discussion veered to next year's congressional elections and the prospect of the republicans holding their lines fast in congress, particularly in the senate where their plurality is small and many of their number will be for re-election. While Senator Butler has not announced whether he will be a candidate to succeed himself a year hence, it was taken for granted at yesterday's outing that he would be in the field.

BANDITS ROB HOTEL IN WILD WEST FASHION

the shots and called by employees, fired on the crew as they left the hotel and Indian "Tex" Cortis or Ted Cortis, wounded by detectives was killed.

In the first outbreak of shooting, one of the robbers guarding Frank Brodkey, assistant cashier, who stood helplessly with hands upraised, shot and killed him.

Former Cowboys

Witnesses later told the police the robber was Jack Holmes, a former Texas cowboy. Holmes fled to the kitchen during the battle with McMurdie. He terrorized employees there until he was captured after snatching his empty pistol in the faces of two policemen.

The third robber, Eric Nelson, a former employe of the hotel commandeered a taxicab and dashed through the congested traffic to the north shore boulevard, exchanging shots with pursuing policemen and threatening Mrs. Marie Larson, occupant of the cab. After the taxi driver deliberately wrecked the cab, injuring Mrs. Larson, Nelson fled on foot and was killed by one of the policemen when he took refuge in a basement.

Admits Complicity

Of the two robbers who escaped in an automobile left sunning at the hotel door, Jim Woods was seized when he applied at a hospital early today for treatment for a wounded hand. He admitted connection with the holdup and augmented the confession of Holmes.

Holmes said the fifth man was Jack Nugent. The police believe Nugent was the stranger who brought Woods to the hospital and who left unnoticed while the injury was being treated.

Robert E. Crowe, state's attorney to whom Holmes made offers to plead guilty to a robbery, said he would ask the grand jury, which adjourns today to sit long enough to indict Woods and Holmes for murder.

Holmes told the police he was in Brownsville, Texas, after enlisting in the army in 1917. He also said he had worked on the K. and K. ranch in Texas.

Story of Shoot-Up

"Tex," the supposed half-blood Cherokee was the first of the robbers to burst into the clerical room behind the cage of the cashier and paymaster of the hotel.

He brandished a revolver and as he entered, cried out: "we are from Texas and I want everybody's hands up quick!"

Woods told a story that Robert Scott, brother of Russell Scott, under sentence to hang, but who has obtained a sanity trial, was a friend and associate of the robber band.

Robert Scott also is charged with murder in the same indictment with Russell and the latter has declared Robert fired the shot and killed a drug clerk for whose death Russell was sentenced.

117 Out of 202 Pupils Fail to Pass Hi-School Examinations on Bible

Of 202 Oregon high school students who took examinations last May on the New Testament for high school graduation credit, 85 passed the test and 117 failed, and of 142 answering questions on the Old Testament 52 passed and 90 failed, according to a report on the examinations made by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, under whose direction the tests were given.

Miss Grace Klampe of Jefferson and Miss Vera E. Klore of Looking Glass each received a grade of 100 per cent in New Testament, and Miss Aletha Allen of Scotts Mills received 100 in Old Testament. Miss Klore made 100 per cent in Old Testament in the January, 1925, examination and has the distinction of being one of very few students in the state who have made perfect grades in both branches.

The questions that were asked in the Old Testament examination were:

Tell the story of the flood.

Tell the story of the serpent in the garden.

Tell the story of the sacrifice of Isaac.

Tell the story of the rebellion of Korah.

Give the memory passage beginning "The Lord is my shepherd."

What is meant by "The period of the judges?"

Tell the story of Samson and Delilah.

Tell of the fall of Jerusalem.

Give the memory passage beginning "My son, forget not my law."

What was the importance of the position occupied by the prophets in the history of Israel?

During what period of the history of Israel did the prophet Daniel live?

Give the memory passage beginning "To whom then will ye liken God?"

Questions in the New Testament test were:

What is the relation of the gospels to one another?

Tell of Christ's rejection at Nazareth.

Tell of the feeding of the four thousand.

Give the memory passage beginning "Though I speak with the tongues of men and angels."

Tell of the healing of the 10 lepers.

Tell of Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem.

Give the memory passage beginning, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for."

Tell who the following were: Bartolomaeus, Pilate, Nicodemus, Barabbas, Stephen.

Tell the parable of the sower.

Tell the parable of the good Samaritan.

Who wrote the epistle to the Romans, and of what does it treat?

Give the memory passage beginning "Then Paul stood in the midst of Mars hill, and said 'Ye men of Athens.'"

SHEPHERD APPEALS TO PROBATE ORPHAN'S WILL

Chicago, July 30.—(AP)—Filing of appeal from the probate court decision denying probate to the purported will of William Nelson McClintock, "millionaire orphan," was completed today by the placing of records in the circuit court by William Darling Shepherd, beneficiary and executor. Weymouth Kirkland, counsel for Shepherd, said that the case would probably get come up for hearing for possibly nearly a year.

No new brief was filed, the matter of record deposited consisting simply of the original petition for probate and the opinion of Probate Judge Henry Horner that the burden of proof rested upon the petitioner, Shepherd, to overcome a presumption of undue influence.

CHINESE STRIKERS SHOT IN RIOT

London, July 30.—An agency dispatch from Hongkong says that 11 Chinese were killed at Canton by the bodyguard of an official before whose house a mob had gathered, demanding a daily cash strike allowance.

The dispatch refers to "an influx of Russians from Vladivostok at Canton," and says two Russian ships have arrived at Whampoa, an outpost twenty seven miles from Canton.

The character of these Russian ships is not indicated, there are large numbers of "white" Russians in various parts of China, where they fled from the bolshevik regime in their own country. There are also "red" Russians in China. The dispatch does not indicate whether the "influx" at Canton is by "reds" or by "whites."

Aberdeen, Wash., July 30.—The 75 foot center span of the Olympic highway bridge over Little Hoquiam river at the North Hoquiam city limits collapsed at five o'clock this morning, hurling containing two men and a woman into the river. None of them was hurt seriously. They were Mr. and Mrs. H. Walpole of Hoquiam and E. Eubank of Aberdeen.
