as killers of the son. Meanwhile Looney was located in New Mexico, arrested on a federal warrant charging interstate transportation of a stolen automobile and, later, when he went to Porto to answer the charge, was taken to Rock Island and arraigned on the indictments, one of which charged the murder of Gabriel. During the trial for alleged conspiracy to protect gambling, Looney produced several sensations, once when he stouted as Assistant Attorney General Hadley, "I'll do what you please with me, but leave my child alone," and later when he was searched and a revolver taken from him.

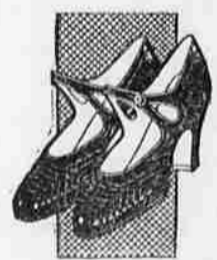

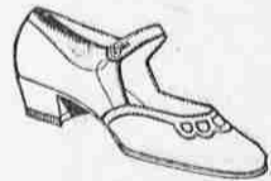
