

### PLOT TO OUST LAMA OF TIBET NIPPED IN BUD

London, July 31.—(A. P.)—Civil war is reported to have broken out in the land of the Lamas, Tibet, in special dispatches from Calcutta, which are described as unofficial.

The situation is said to have developed through a plot by military officials who had been trained abroad and imbued with ideas, as against the ancient rules of priesthood under the heads of the Lamaist church of Tibet—and Buddhism. The officers, the dispatches show, plotted to overthrow Lamas and in order to do this, attempted to make war on the Sera and Crapang monasteries, the main strongholds of the Lamaist monks. The plot was discovered and the Tibetan commander in chief was degraded and replaced by Drasau Drampa, a relative of the Dalai Lama, spiritual head of the country.

The general commanding the Dalai Lama's body and another supporter of modern western ideas also was degraded while a third plotter, Manjur Padma Chandra, was killed while trying to escape to Calcutta, where he has relatives.

The Lamaist hierarchy is declared to be as fanatical as ever against the introduction of modernism in any form. Details of the fighting have not been received and the dispatches do not show how far the description of the "civil war" is justified.

### MONKEY GLANDS ADAPT THEMSELVES TO HUMANS

Paris, July 31.—(A. P.)—Dr. Serge Voronoff, the gland specialist, has declared that his work in grafting "establishing organs of the higher species of monkeys adapt themselves perfectly to the human body, is another confirmation of our close relationship with the anthropoids."

The famous monkey gland surgeon expressed his opinion in adding his signature to the list of representative French scientists being made up by the newspaper Quotidien as a protest against "the attack upon the liberty of thought" made by the recent Scopes trial at Dayton, Tenn.

### MELLON DENIES STORY OF HIS RESIGNATION

New York, July 31.—Secretary Mellon, who is spending the summer here, denies the story that he is to resign from the cabinet. A statement issued by his secretary said: "Mr. Mellon authorized me to say he cannot understand the repeated stories about his leaving the cabinet. He would have preferred to ignore this latest one but takes occasion to deny its truth so that the public will have no doubt about his intention to remain as head of the treasury department."

### RESUME SEARCH FOR TRIBE OF TAILED MEN IN ISLES

Los Angeles, Cal., July 31.—Search for a tribe of "tailed men" will be resumed this fall by W. Loy Hess, who announced today he would leave in September for the Philippines, in one of the practically unexplored islands of which group he hopes to find his "missing link." Others members of the expedition will include, he said, Max Fleischmann, wealthy yeast manufacturer. Hess led a similar expedition in 1923 but could not connect with the ape-like man.

### KLAN KLEAGLE WITH AFFINITY SURRENDERS

Newark, N. J., July 31.—(A. P.)—R. Carl Ziegler, married minister and deposed klan official, and Miss Margaret Roberts of Trenton, with whom he eloped to El Paso, Texas, surrendered at the office of United States Commissioner Sommers today. Federal warrants were issued yesterday for their arrest for conspiracy to violate the Mann act.

### PREJUDICE ALLEGED BY INDICTED PROSECUTOR

Klamath Falls, Or., July 31.—Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt late yesterday afternoon granted an affidavit of prejudice filed on behalf of E. L. Elliott, former county prohibition director who was indicted by the grand jury this week on a charge of malfeasance in office. The court announced that an outside jurist would be called to sit in the trial of the case. Elliott takes office tomorrow morning as district attorney of Klamath county under appointment by Governor Pierce. He succeeds William Ganonn, who resigned because of illness.

### DEMPSEY MAY TAKE ON GREB

Los Angeles, Cal., July 31.—(A. P.)—Jack Dempsey still is willing to meet Harry Greb at Michigan City next September providing Promoter Fitzsimmons will make it interesting enough for him financially.

The champion explained last night that he had about given up hope of a September bout when week after week passed and "nothing definite was done about it."

He, however, expressed his willingness to go ahead with the bout. "If Fitzsimmons can sign Greb and we can reach an agreement when he comes out here to sign me, as I suppose he will, in order to be in shape for the fight if it goes through I am continuing my light training," Dempsey said he was planning to wire the New York boxing commission that he could not possibly be in New York within the two weeks limit allowed him for signing for the bout with Harry Greb, but would be willing to meet the negro fighter next July 4 or any date thereafter.

### DALLAS LAYING NEW WATER LINE

Dallas, Or., July 31.—The work of laying intake pipe to tap an additional source of water supply for Dallas from the La Creole above Applegate creek will be completed about the middle of September, according to W. L. Soehron, manager of the Dallas Water company.

The relaying of old intake pipe which has been in progress since the first of the month has been completed and the new construction will not interfere with the city's present supply. The new intake will practically double the source of supply as it will give two 7-inch mains flowing into a 16-inch main from the mountain streams on the upper La Creole west of Dallas.

Klamath Falls, Or., July 31.—W. S. Levens, state prohibition commissioner, was expected to arrive here by noon today to submit to arrest following a secret indictment charging him with larceny which was returned by the grand jury early this week.
