

BANKS OF STATE SHOW INCREASED ASSETS IN YEAR

In comparison with the aggregate resources of all banks in the state on the same date for a period of five years, a statement by Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, shows that the assets at the close of business on June 30, 1925, disclose a gradual increase from \$297,000,000 on June 30, 1921, to \$311,000,000 on June 30, 1925. There has been an increase of \$12,400,000 since June 30, 1924.

Loans and discounts on June 30, 1925, were \$168,000,000 as compared with \$171,000,000 on June 30, 1924, or a reduction in loans and discounts of approximately \$3,100,000.

During the same period of time, investments in United States municipal and other bonds and securities have increased from \$65,700,000 to \$77,200,000 or an increase in this class of liquid assets during the past year of \$11,500,000. Investments therefore, in bonds, securities and other interest bearing investments show a net increase of approximately \$5,500,000, or a reduction of this amount over and above the reduction in loans and discounts of \$1,100,000.

During the same period of time, the reserves maintained are \$63,000,000 as compared with \$59,200,000 at the close of business on June 30, 1924, or an increase in actual available reserves of \$4,000,000, making a total of \$16,100,000 accumulated liquid assets over and above those which existed at the close of the same period last year.

In the same period of time there has been a noticeable increase in deposits. On June 30, 1924, demand deposits of all classes were the sum of \$167,700,000 as compared with \$173,500,000 on June 30, 1925, or a net increase in demand deposits of the sum of \$5,800,000.

This increase has developed notwithstanding the fact that there has been a decrease of \$1,028,000 in deposits maintained with the respective banks by the state treasurer were \$8,469,482.01 and on June 30, 1925, these funds represented \$7,441,288.80.

During the one year period from June 30, 1924, time and savings deposits increased approximately \$7,400,000. The increase in all classes of demand, time and savings deposits from June 30, 1924, to the date of this report showed

an aggregate of \$113,500,000. The assets maintained representing this deposit increase consist of government and municipal bonds and additional cash reserves, showing that as the volume of deposits have accumulated these funds have been reinvested in assets showing an additional liquid condition representing approximately the amount of increased deposits over and above those which existed at the close of business on June 30, 1925. This discloses a policy generally developed for conservatism and providing for a larger ratio of high class securities and liquid assets against deposit liabilities with a larger volume and higher ratio of convertible securities than have existed at any time in the history of the banking business in this state.

On June 30, 1925, there were 54 cities and towns in the state reporting deposits in excess of \$500,000 or 155 banks with aggregate deposits of \$261,672,000. On June 30, 1922, there were 47 cities and towns showing deposits in excess of \$500,000 with 140 banks reporting the aggregate of \$210,999,000.

GREAT PRO-AMERICAN DEMONSTRATION STAGED

Lemberg, Poland.—The recent dedication of the monument to the three American aviators—Kelly, Graves and McCullum—members of the famous Kosciuszko squadron who were killed during the war against the Soviets in 1919-1920, developed into a great Pro-American demonstration.

The monument represents an American aviator with American and Polish arms in the background, and stands in one of the most picturesque parts of Lemberg cemetery. It was erected from funds contributed by a special committee headed by Mrs. Ebnberger, patroness of the famous squadron.

JAPAN WILL EXTEND MILITARY TRAINING

Toyko.—The military training of all students in Japan, which is embodied in the proposed national military training system, was commenced recently in the normal schools of the empire. It is planned to extend the system to the students of the middle and other schools of the higher grade next year.

The estimated cost of inaugurating the program in the lower and higher grades has been estimated at 6,000,000 yen. It is hoped that the new system will be in operation by 1928. The military authorities will be asked to supply some 300,000 rifles to the different schools and young men's associations.

ARCHAEOLOGICAL HAUL MADE IN PHILIPPINES

Manila.—One of the most extensive archaeological investigations ever made in the Philippine Islands covering a period of three years, has been completed by an expedition, headed by Dr. Carl E. Guthe of the University of Michigan. A large number of articles, principally Chinese pottery, have already been shipped to the University of Michigan and other shipments are to follow.

"The expedition which was initiated through the efforts of the late Dean C. Worcester, former secretary of the interior of the Philippines, has merely scratched the surface of Philippine archaeology," Dr. Guthe stated, "and we hope that the results obtained thus far will serve as a basis to advance the study of Philippine anthropology among scientists."
