

SENATORS WIN CHAMPIONSHIP FROM LUCKENBACH

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The Salem Senators won the Interstate league championship yesterday when they defeated the Luckenbach Ship company nine on the Oxford park diamond by a score of 7 to 4. The game was one of the crabbliest yet played on the local diamond this year, the visitors protesting vigorously on nearly every decision.

"Speed" Carroll, manager of the Luckenbach nine, became so angry on two different occasions that he threw his bat with vigor. In the eighth Keene came to bat. Rankin called a strike which he did not agree with and let his bat fall to the ground. Rankin had stood so much already that he put Keene out of the game. Ashby went in to bat for him and struck out. Ashby went into right field and Soleman covered the keystone sack. Carroll still continued to rag the umpire but was not put out.

Tied in Third.

The locals started out early and scored one run in the second inning but they were tied in the third by the visitors. Keene, first man up in the second inning, got a double; Barr fanned; Reinhart singled and stole second; Keene tasing at third; Edwards squeezed Keene across the plate; Barham flew out to Goleman.

In their half of the third the shipmen scored one run on a series of errors. Welfel was safe at second on Proctor's error; McKenna sacrificed him to third, while Maples threw him out at first; Stranahan came through with a single and Zweifel scored; Helmke was safe at second on Proctor's error. This set a man on third and second with only one down. Goleman fanned and Clynes went out, Barham to Keene.

The locals answered three more runs in their part of the third inning. Bouton got a hit; Proctor attempted to sacrifice him to second, but neither one of them were out; Maples beat out a sacrifice and the bases were loaded with no out; Steers fanned; Maples was caught off of first and this made bases again. Coleman went in to bat for Dog Barr, who has failed to hit in the last few games. Coleman walked and Bouton was forced in; Reinhart doubled and Proctor and Keene tallied; Edwards flew out to Coleman.

Score in Fourth.

In the fourth frame the Senators started out again, but were only able to get one run across. Barham fanned; Bouton doubled; Proctor was robbed of a hit when Stranahan reached up and took his line drive; Maples singled and Bouton tallied; Maples was caught at second trying to stretch the hit on the throw in.

The ship men were unable to score again until the eighth when they failed to score. The innings were interrupted several times while the visitors crabbied. In the fifth McKenna, Luckenbach shortstop, was caught at the plate and how he did crab at that decision. In their half of the fifth the locals scored two more runs on a series of errors, the first of the game for the visitors. Steers got a hit over short; Keene was safe on Clark's error and Steers went to third; Coleman was safe at second on Stranahan's error and Steers crossed the plate, Keene going to third; Reinhart fanned but Keene tased when Helmke let the ball get through him, Coleman going to third. This ended the scoring for the locals although they threatened in nearly every inning.

Visitors Lose Out.

In the eighth the visitors annexed two more. Helmke, first man at bat in this inning, doubled. Goleman went out at first and

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Helmke advanced to third; Clynes went out at first and Helmke tallied; Clarke was safe at second on Males' error; Groce doubled and Clark scored; Carroll fanned and proceeded to throw his bat to show his disfavor.

In the ninth the visitors tried hard to tie or win the game. Zweifel, first man up, hit a homer over the right field fence; McKenna was safe on Coleman's error at first, Keene being put out of the game in the eighth; Stranahan flew out to Reinhart; Helmke was safe at first on a fielder's choice while Proctor threw McKenna out at second. Goleman was safe on Proctor's error and Helmke went to second; Clynes struck the air three times to end the game and make the locals champions.

The Senators' season closed with yesterday's game, "Frisco" Edwards, manager of the Senators, is trying for several games and romping the fans some of the best games of the year now that the league season is finished. Edwards is going out after tough competition and is going to meet some of the best teams available. He is dickering for a game with the Cyclops, winners of the Greater Portland league for next Sunday. If he is able to get them here the fans are promised one of the best games ever seen on the local diamond. The Cyclops team has a strong nine and has finished the season in Portland with twelve wins and no losses. Other games equally as good are to be scheduled. Edwards urges the fans to back the locals as they are playing good ball and are getting hard teams.

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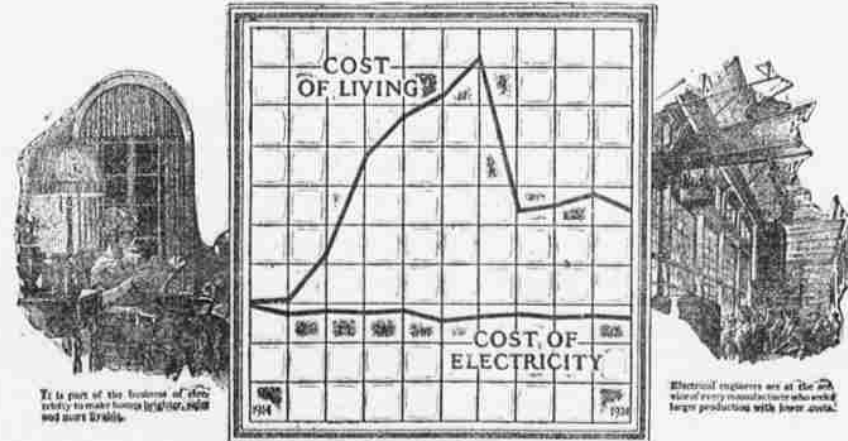
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
