WAGE SCALE CONFERENCE OFF

Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 4.—(A. P.)—Anthracite scale negotiations will definitely be broken off on resumption of the wage scale conference this afternoon, barring unforeseen developments, according to an opinion voiced by a high authority among the miners today. What ground would likely be added for such a break was not indicated.

Anthracite operators on arrival for the meeting expressed full determination to uphold at all costs the dignity of their scale committee against the challenge they felt John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, had raised against it.

Samuel D. Warriner, chairman of the anthracite operators' conference, and William J. Richards, president of the Philadelphia & Reading Coal & Iron company, whose presence Mr. Lewis had requested today did not accompany the other operators here. It was officially announced the two leaders would not come.

In a deal that was completed last Saturday, Lester Schlossberg of Salem sold his lease, pool and fixtures in the Smart Shop at Albany to his partner, Ray C. McDewitt. The establishment is a ladies ready-to-wear store on First street, Albany.

Mr. Schlossberg will move the entire stock of the Albany store to his store in Salem and will operate here on a bigger scale than he has heretofore. He established the Smart shop in Salem as a year ago and has rapidly built up the establishment into one of the leading mercantile institutions of the city.

Mr. Schlossberg says that Salem offers sufficient opportunity to any dealer in his line who wishes to prosper, and that there is no reason why he should divide his attention between Salem and another city.

The barbers and their families of the Willamette valley unions including Albany, Corvallis and Salem and adjacent towns convened in the Santiam park at Jefferson Sunday for an all day picnic. Approximately 300 were present. The program consisted of brief speeches, songs, instrumental music, games, swimming in the Santiam and other diversions. A big basket dinner was featured at the noon hour.

The boys' YMCA camp at Neekowin will break up early tomorrow afternoon, the boys being brought back to Salem in automobiles, and expected to arrive by 5 o'clock. There were some 60 boys at the camp when it was established two weeks ago. Four came back last Sunday. About 20 of the boys are from various parts of Marion and Polk counties outside of Salem, the remainder being from the city. There will be three trucks and four private cars sent to Neekowin, two of the trucks being for the purpose of transporting the tents and baggage.

Officials of the Salem Water company are still undecided as to the reason for the peculiar taste that has been noticed in the drinking water, it was stated this morning by Chas. A. Park, president of the company. When the taste was first noticed it was suspected by company officials that it might be due to algae, a minute vegetable organism that sometimes gets into drinking water. No definite information was available at that time, however, and none is available now. Mr. Park stated that the reservoir through which the water passes is cleaned out about once every three or four weeks.

Cedric Chang, graduate of Willamette university last spring, left Salem this morning for Springfield International YMCA college, which he will attend for the next two years. Mr. Chang was granted a scholarship at the college last spring. Before leaving today he stated that after graduation he will return to China, where he was born, and take up YMCA work there.

Last night there were 62 cars at the camp, 46 of which were new arrivals. Sunday night there was a total of 73, 57 of which were new. Last year the number ran on an average of over 100 a night throughout the summer months.

BAN PUT ON BOXERS WHO SIGN UP BOUTS WITH JACK DEMPSEY

dition which would do harm here any fighter who engages the champion in a preliminary to the Wills match. Dealing with another troublesome issue, the commission took no action against Mickey Walker, welterweight champion, for his failure to go through with an engagement to fight his California challenger, Dave Shade here, but indicated it would discipline Walker upon the expiration of the time limit, August 15, set for this bout.

Dempsey himself was unable to appear to defend himself orally. He has written the commission asking its indulgence in his delay, resulting from the straightening out of his business affairs with Manager Jack Kearns, but word went forth last night that the days of grace for the champion had reached an end.

Anticipating the dethroning of Dempsey today, as well as the commission's approval of "championship" battle between Wills and Gene Tunney, Promoter Tex Rickard has already taken preliminary steps to stage a contest between the challenger this fall.

Rickard says that Dempsey positively will not fight this year. Mickey Walker, welterweight champion, who was slated yesterday to accompany Dempsey back into the ranks of the New York infelicitous because of his failure to arrange for the defense of his title against Dave Shade, today was in Chicago, training for a fight with Billy Wells.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 4.—Jack Dempsey, when informed of today's action of the New York boxing commission banning any fighter who would meet him before he signs articles and posts a forfeit to fight Harry Wills, said: "If New York bans the Wills match it is open to any or all promoters throughout the country."

In a written statement the champion drew the deduction that the New York body "has in mind some certain club or promoter to stage his fight. Of course, there is method in the official decree, but it is past me to do a lot of guessing."

FRENCH GIRL SWIMS CHANNEL

Dover, Eng., Aug. 4.—(AP)—At 8:50 tonight Miss. Sion was only five miles from the Dover pier in her attempt to swim the English channel.

Experts here think that if she is able to swim about three miles in the next two hours and a half she has a good chance of landing somewhere east of Dover, as high tide occurs just after midnight.

The French tug which is accompanying Miss Sion is now visible from the Dover pier. It moves slowly ahead, showing that Miss Sion continues her progress for Dover. The weather is fair and the sea moderate.

Cape Girardeau, France, Aug. 4.—Miss. Jane Sion was six miles out from Cape Girardeau two hours and forty minutes after she began her attempt to swim the English channel today. She appeared to be swimming strongly. The sea was calm, the weather cloudy and the temperature of the water 53 degrees Fahrenheit.

At 10:50 o'clock it was estimated that Miss Sion would be out of sight of the French coast within half an hour.

PROBE DEATH OF ASYLUM INMATE

At the request of Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane, District Attorney John H. Carson and Coroner Lloyd T. Rigdon are today investigating the death of Alfred M. Woods, colored, an inmate who died at the hospital this morning.

Woods, who was of powerful physique, ran amuck last Sunday and it took the combined efforts of several attendants to subdue him. According to Dr. Steiner the fight with the attendants may have been a contributing factor to his death. However, the doctor has been afflicted with an incurable disease. He was committed from Portland last July.

Dr. Steiner said the attendants used no weapons except their hands in subduing Woods.

SUPPOSED VICTIM OF EXPLOSION REAPPEARS

Marine, Cal., Aug. 4.—(A. P.)—Joe Rodriguez, Portuguese laborer, whose disappearance from Walnut Creek the night of the explosion that partially wrecked the plant of the Pacific Cellulose company led to the belief he had been slain, has reappeared alive and well.

He returned to Walnut Creek shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon and reported to the authorities who had been attempting to identify the corpse found after an explosion last Thursday night as Rodriguez. Instead of Charles Henry Schwartz, Berkeley chemist, first thought to have been the victim.

NEED IODINE TO AVERT GOITRE

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 4.—(A. P.)—Fate of the gland living in a belt extending from New York to the Rocky mountains have incipient goiter and the number so afflicted is increasing with the growth of population, declared Dr. J. W. Turrentine of the United States department of agriculture in a paper presented today at the seventh meeting of the American Chemical Society, which is being held here.

This increase might be checked, Dr. Turrentine said, if growing children were given a daily portion of four-millionths of an ounce of iodine. The readiest form in which this may be taken into the system is seaweed, one thousandth of an ounce of dry algae or seaweed contains the essential quantity of iodine. The same result may be obtained from eating 2.5 ounces of oysters, 24 ounces of sea fish, 200 ounces of fresh water fish, 200 ounces of eggs, 440 ounces of lettuce, 500 ounces of milk or 2400 ounces of wheat.

"These figures," explained Dr. Turrentine, "show how difficult it is to plan a menu from ordinary articles of diet which will provide adequate quantities of the essential iodine."

DIVISION DITCH PLAN ADOPTED

With action of the city council last night in approving a plan for the filing of the Division street ditch, the way is now clear for the establishment of the factory of the Western Pacific Converting company in Salem, and articles of incorporation will be filed today or tomorrow. Construction of the factory will start at once.

The ditch controversy was settled to the satisfaction of property holders, the paper company and the city council by the company agreeing to pay \$1500 toward the expense and the chamber of commerce agreeing to pay all necessary in excess of that amount. It is believed the cost will not exceed \$2000. Dirt for filling the ditch will be obtained mainly from streets where improvement work is in progress.
