TRY AGAIN TO ELECT DIRECTORS FOR DRAINAGE

A second attempt will be made Friday night to elect three directors to head the affairs of the new Salem drainage district. The election will be held at 7:30 o'clock at the Richmond school and efforts are being made to get out a material representation from among property holders of the district in order to assure an election and get organization underway.

As far as known no slate has been picked, although it is known a number of land owners in the district who are opposed to the plan have suggested the name of F. W. Durbin as a director. Durbin was the main remonstrator against the district and these land owners believe that with his election and that of two others opposed to the plan, the district may bring about dissolution proceedings and block the work entirely.

A vote an acre is allowed at the meeting. Fractional acres must vote by proxy, as fractional acre holders may join together in such a manner as to add their fractional holdings up into acre units to permit voting.

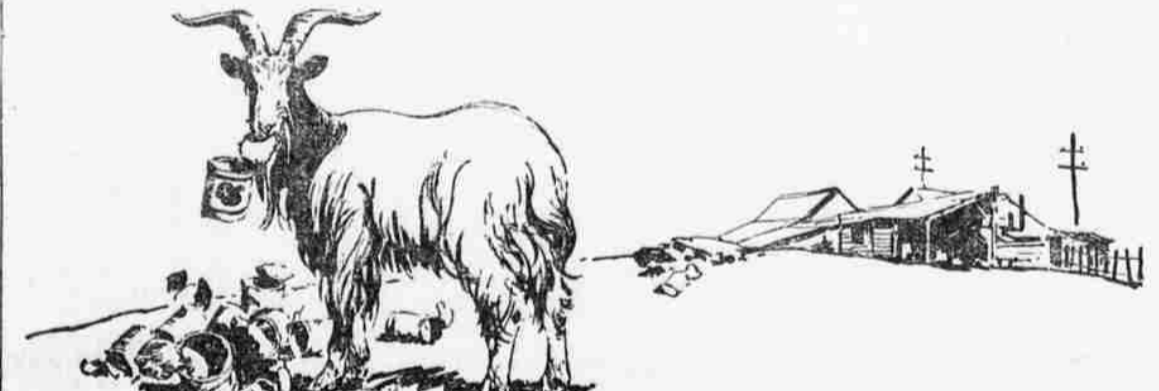
