MASS MEETING ON WATER ISSUE

Mayor John B. Giesy announces that he is calling a mass meeting to be held at the chamber of commerce next Monday night for the purpose of discussing plans for obtaining an appraisal valuation of the water plant for the Salem Water Light & Power company as an initial step toward municipal ownership of the water system and the ultimate development of a gravity supply of mountain water.

Whether a question pertaining to obtaining such a valuation will be placed on the ballot at the proposed special election in November remains to be seen, and this probably will be discussed Monday night.

Some investigation already has been made by a special committee of the city council, and what has been done will be told Monday night by George Wenderoth, chairman of the committee.

PAROLE O'REILLY AFTER SENTENCE

James O'Reilly was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary by Judge McMahan late yesterday afternoon and paroled. O'Reilly pleaded guilty to embezzling coupon books from the Shell Oil company by which he formerly was employed. A condition of his parole is that he repay within a year to the oil company the \$220 which he was charged with embezzling. Judge McMahan stated that the only amount which he could compel O'Reilly to agree to repay was that included in the indictment. The oil company has secured a judgment against O'Reilly for between \$7000 and \$8000 based on alleged speculations, but the criminal charge included only a fraction of that amount.

O'Reilly has been for many years a resident of Salem during which time he has been engaged in various occupations. He is widely known here.

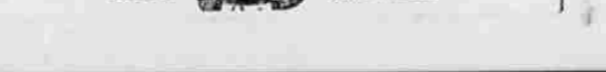

New York, Aug. 7.—The marriage of Miss Isabel Rockefeller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Percy A. Rockefeller, to Frederic W. Lincoln Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederic W. Lincoln, will take place on September 25. It was learned yesterday. The Rockefeller and Lincoln families have homes in New York and Greenwich, Conn.

Miss Rockefeller is a grand niece of John D. Rockefeller and granddaughter of the late James Stillman, for many years president of the National City bank.

This will be the second alliance between the Rockefeller and the Lincoln families. William A. Rockefeller, a cousin of Miss Rockefeller, was married to Miss Florence Lincoln, sister of Frederic W. Lincoln Jr., in February, 1918.

AIR SERVICE ONLY A JOKE

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 7.—Colonel William Mitchell, former assistant chief of the United States army air service with the rank of brigadier general, gave indications here yesterday that he would launch another attack against present conditions of the air service when congress convenes in the fall.

Referring to the air service he said: "As long as we are under the army and navy we will not have any air service. We haven't more than a dozen fighting ships and the rest are nothing but toy outfits falling down around our ears."

Colonel Mitchell was recently deprived of his rank of brigadier general, following a controversy over aircraft policies in Washington last spring. He was transferred to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, where he is now stationed. He described in detail the possibilities of air defense in case of war, maintaining that the air service should be separate and distinct from either the army or navy departments of government.

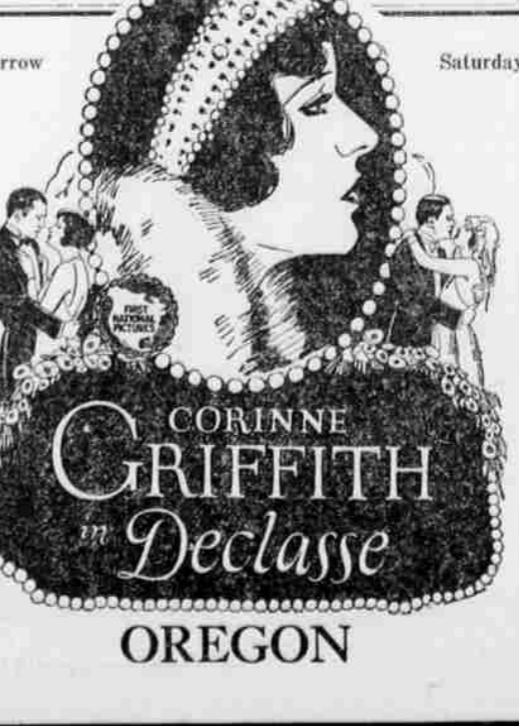
