DALLAS SCHOOL TEACH MACHINE SHOP CLASSES

Dallas, Or., Aug. 5.—An innovation in co-operative vocational education will be inaugurated in the Dallas high school this year according to announcement of R. R. Turner, superintendent of schools, today. This will be the starting of a course in machine shop work for a limited class of boys at the Dallas Machine & Locomotive Works under supervision of a competent instructor.

of the Mississippi to inaugurate such a plan. The course will be limited to eight boys from the senior class and eight boys from the junior class. Each class will put in a half day every school day under actual shop conditions at the shop, working shop hours. Their other school work will be pursued during the half day they are not employed at the shop.

The work is designed to fit them for vocational work in the shops, and the boys selected to take the course will be largely those who do not plan on going on to college. Two credits toward college, however, will be allowed for each year's work, and those who later change their minds and desire to attend college will not be handicapped.

The Dallas schools will start about the middle of September. Falls City, Or., Aug. 5.—The Buell Mill company has purchased a new boiler at Cottage Grove for their mill and have moved it to within a week of their new mill setting. FIRE DESTROYS RAILROAD BRIDGE AT BLACK ROCK

Falls City, Aug. 5.—(Special)—The Southern Pacific railroad bridge at the end of the Falls City and Black Rock branch was totally destroyed by fire of unknown origin which started at 2:39 o'clock this morning, and as a result operations on the Willamette Valley logging road extending from Black Rock will come to a halt indefinitely, pending rebuilding of the structure. The Willamette Valley company has been operating two and three logging trains a day from their camp into Dallas, all of them working from Forest Grove, where the Southern Pacific branch line into Dallas. It is estimated something over \$2000 will be required to put the bridge back into condition to operate logging trains over it. The bridge is right at Black Rock and

SALT CREEK RANCHER DIES IN STATE HOSPITAL Dallas, Or., Aug. 5.—Dave East, old time farmer of the Salt Creek district, died on August 2 at the state hospital after a period of "convalescence" that covered 42 years, according to notification received by County Clerk Blah. The old papers show that Mr. East was sent to the hospital on August 29, 1883, at the age of 32 years. He escaped in about three months and was re-committed 10 years later. The hospital notification indicates that his last commitment was in 1908, but there is no local record. Mr. East is remembered by a number of local old timers.
