Mrs. Eckman will be host on August 17.

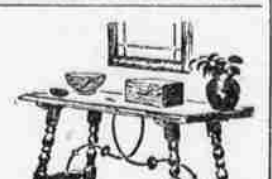

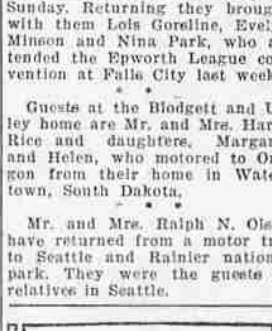
