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Tracy was now traveling alone, and let it be known that he had killed Merrill in a duel. On July 3, Deputy Sheriff Raymond of Snohomish county and E. E. Broese, a police officer, were killed by Tracy and he fatally wounded a deputy game warden named Rawley of Seattle.
