

CHAMP FAVORS FITZSIMMONS FOR PROMOTER

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 13.—Jack Dempsey threw his weight behind Floyd Fitzsimmons' efforts to obtain the right to stage a Dempsey-Wills fight for the heavyweight championship with two declarations made here late Wednesday. The first was:

"Fitzsimmons has made me a bettie offer than any likely to come from any other promoter and he has my signature to a contract."

The second statement, given with an air of finality that seemed to eliminate all chance of Tex Rickard staging the bout in New York was brief and unqualified.

"I will not fight in New York state."

A third remark concerning statements by Jack Kearns that he still had managerial power over Dempsey's engagements and that he intended to sign for a Dempsey-Wills fight, also was brief and unqualified.

It was: "I'll do my own signing. Let Kearns sign if he wants to, but what good will it do him?"

TRAFFIC COP TO DIRECT TRAFFIC

An effort will be made as soon as practicable to secure a special traffic officer for the Salem police force, the officer to be placed at the intersection of State and Commercial streets during the busiest hours of the day, it was stated yesterday by Mayor John B. Glesy.

No definite action is expected in the immediate future, due to the fact that the budget appropriation for the city police department does not allow for the employment of an extra man.

"I have personally investigated," said Mr. Glesy yesterday, "and I am convinced that there is no question of the need of a special traffic officer there."

GERMANS WANT PROPERTY BACK

Washington, Aug. 13.—(A. P.)—A formal communication pressing for the return of German property seized by the United States during the war has been presented to Secretary Kellogg by the German ambassador. No comment was available at the state department beyond admission that such a communication had been received and was being considered. The text has not been made public, but the memorandum is understood to point out that, in view of the status of the operations of the Dawes reparations plan and the benefit to be derived from these payments by the United States, the time appears apt to take up for settlement of German properties still held by the Washington government.

OREGON TRUNK OBJECTS TO ESPEE

Washington, Aug. 13.—(A. P.)—Further differences between railroads over construction projected in central Oregon were developed before the interstate commerce commission today when the Oregon Trunk railroad tentatively assumed a hostile position to the plan of the Central Pacific to build 40 miles of line from Klamath Falls, Oregon, to Cornell, Cal.

The Oregon Trunk declared its own proposal to extend a railroad from Bend, Ore., to Klamath Falls would be affected by the Central Pacific's plan.

"The Oregon Trunk desires to investigate and determine whether a line of railroad extending southeasterly from Klamath Falls through the territory referred to

in the application herein and continuing to connect with existing lines in California, would be justified," the declaration said.

SCOTT DENIES SERVANT'S TALE

Alpena, Mich., Aug. 13.—(A. P.)—Congressman Frank D. Scott, on the witness stand in his divorce suit here denied the testimony yesterday of Floren Dalziel, Filipino house servant, who by deposition declared he had found Mr. Scott and Miss Jane Kennedy, his secretary, alone in the congressman's office at night.

Mrs. Scott's much discussed dressing gown again was brought into court and Mr. Scott declared the garment was not the same one Mrs. Scott had in Washington.

PETAÏN TO TAKE CHARGE OF DRIVE

Paris, Aug. 13.—(A. P.)—Marshal PetaÏn will leave for Morocco before August 20 to direct what is planned to be the final phase of operations to crush Abdel-Krim and his rebellious followers.

With the junction of the western wings of the French and Spanish forces already effected at Amezou, in the region of Ksar-el-Kbir, on the Loukkos river, the final operations of the two armies are ready to begin.

The plan is to couple the concentration in one region of the elusive Moors, which may force them to accept a pitched battle on which the fate of Morocco will depend.

CELEBRATES FREEDOM BY MURDER AND SUICIDE

Stockton, Cal., Aug. 13.—E. Pedrosa of Pittsburg, Cal. closed his first day of freedom from the Contra Costa county jail by stabbing Mrs. Maehoria Figueroa to death last night with a hunting knife in a local rooming house and then plunging the knife into himself. Pedrosa died on the way to the hospital. No cause for the murder and suicide could be learned by the police.

Mrs. Figueroa has been living here with her three children, her husband being in Mexico.

Tourist Dies in Car

Medford, Or., Aug. 13.—Thomas Jefferson Reynolds, 60 years old, of Vallejo, Cal., died suddenly here Tuesday while riding in a car on a return trip from his vacation, accompanied by his wife and daughter. Cerebral hemorrhage was given as the cause.

GLOBE TROTTER PRINTER DIES OF HEART'S DISEASE

A. W. Sefton, globe trotter, labor agitator, newspaper man, printer, and veteran of half a dozen other callings, died suddenly on his front doorstep at 535 North 13th street shortly after 6 o'clock last night. He was returning from work at the Oregon Statesman, where he has been employed in the composing room for approximately 5 years past.

His death closed a varied and colorful career. He had traveled widely, and a personal friend of many men prominent in national affairs. He was 60 years of age at the time of his death.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Anna M. Sefton, of Salem; his mother, Mrs. J. H. Ransom, of Los Angeles; a son, Wayne Edward, aged 6 years, four brothers and a sister. The sister is Mrs. Eleanor P. Street of Oakland, Cal., and the brother Fred C. formerly of Salem now of Yoncalla, Ore., Ira H. of Greenfield, Cal., Thomas G. of Portland, Ore., and Roy V. of their homes.

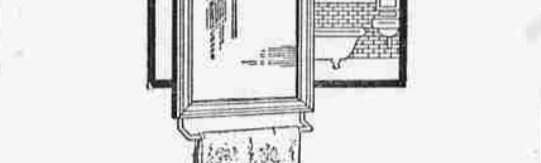
The treasure was handled affectionately by scores of people who discussed it from all angles.
