4 KILLED WHEN AUTO SMASHES TRAIN HARRISBURG

Eugene, Aug. 14.—Four people are dead and two are painfully injured as a result of an accident near Harrisburg at 3:30 last night when a 16 year old boy, at the wheel of a light automobile, turned his car across the Southern Pacific line, and Eugene local number 33, southbound, struck the machine squarely in the center.

bad cut over one eye, scalp and face wounds, an injured shoulder and other hurts. Merwin Castle was driving the car.

The party was bound for Harrisburg hopyards to help in the harvest, and was traveling along the highway parallel to the railroad tracks. A detour, occasioned by new pavement, lay ahead, and the boy without looking for a train, turned his car up the short grade to cross the tracks. One of the girls in the machine saw the train and screamed, but it was too late.

The train hit the car squarely, hurling it into the air. Those who were killed were badly mutilated, it is said. Evelyn, the injured girl, was found on the pilot of the locomotive when the train was brought to a stop.

The injured were placed aboard the train and rushed to a local hospital. The dead were taken to a Harrisburg morgue. Merwyn Castle is the son of J. Emmett Castle of 335 east Davis street, Portland.

FOREST FIRE BURNING NEAR M'KENZIE BRIDGE

Eugene, Or., Aug. 14.—A forest fire covering 125 acres of logged-over land was reported near McKenzie bridge in the Cascade national forest bounds yesterday evening. Green timber stands are on all sides of the fire. Thirty men were dispatched to combat the flames and today the blaze was under control. Rain, which fell last night for the first time in 61 days, aided the firefighters.

A 50-acre fire on Drift creek, in the Siuslaw national forest, was checked when it reached green timber. A small fire near Belknap Springs in the Cascade forest was also checked.

French Advance Fez, French Morocco, Aug. 14.—(AP)—A French column has advanced in to the Sarraz mountain range, after having had the territory under bombardment. The advance was carried on from Anzoum, in the region of Kas-el-Kbir on the Loukkou river, where the junction of the western wings of the French and Spanish forces was effected several days ago. The disarming tribesmen are fleeing with their flocks, hurried by the French.

GRAY EAGLE SEEN CIRCLING OVER DALLAS
