

# BANDITS GRAB \$75,000 PAYROLL

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 14—(AP)—In a daring daylight holdup of the cashier of the Winnipeg street railway company today, five robbers obtained a payroll pouch containing between \$50,000 and \$75,000 and escaped in an automobile. The automobile belongs to the company, and the five men surrounded the cashier, Dick Shaw, as he stepped from its running board with the money in a sack for a payroll. The robbery occurred in mid-forenoon on one of the busiest corners in this city.

Shaw was struck to the pavement with the butt of a pistol when he refused to hand over the money. He lay on the pavement as the robbers jumped into his car, and the driver, at their demand, set it rapidly away.

The car was found a half hour's speedy travel from the scene of the robbery.

# ARCTIC PLANE OUT OF ORDER

Washington, Aug. 14—(AP)—With one of its planes temporarily out of commission, the MacMillan Arctic expedition is going ahead with the other two to establish an intermediate base at Flahlerjord, on Ellsmere island, about 180 miles from Etah, Greenland, the main base.

The airplane NA-2 was damaged at Etah during a storm yesterday. She was put aboard the steamer Bowdoin to be repaired. The planes NA-1 and NA-3 weathered the storm safely.

Flahlerjord was decided upon for a sub-base between Etah and Cape Thomas Hubbard on Axel Heiberg island, where the advance flying base will be located during a reconnaissance flight Tuesday night. It was planned to place supplies there last night.

# GIRL SWIMMER TO TRY AGAIN

Boulogne, France, Aug. 14—Miss Lillian Harrison of Buenos Aires, who was compelled to abandon her fourth attempt to swim across the English channel on Monday when about eight miles from the English coast, has made up her mind to have another trial this week on Monday, especially if Miss Gertrude Ederie, of New York, decides to start then.

Efforts are being made to induce Miss Ederie, French swimmer, who was forced to abandon her attempt to swim the channel early this month when a gale and a half from her goal, to start out on Monday night also. But the French woman does not command such resources as the others and says she will not be ready to start until the end of the month, or early in September.

Miss Ederie's preparations now are virtually complete and she has at short notice if she definitely decides to start on Monday.

# MANHUNT IS SHIFTED TO DRIFT CREEK

The logical route it offers. This, they said, was found to be the opinion of woodmen and hunters with whom they conferred. It would be necessary for the convicts to follow the creek bed in the main because of the density of the skirting brush. The creek bed does not carry a running stream, but only an occasional pool of water, and the nature of the footing is such that to track a man along the creek would be impossible. A fugitive not accustomed to the woods, said the Portland trailers, would follow the highways.

Man Hunt Disorganized

The Portland officers, particularly Captain Lewis, severely criticized the organization of the chase declaring that it lacks leadership. Roads and bridges are utterly unguarded, said Lewis, and he and his fellow officers were able to travel from Portland to Salem at midnight, and from Salem into the wooded district eastward without being accosted by possum or gopher at bridges or any other place.

Warden Dalrymple, keeping in touch with operations by telephone from his office, yesterday directed the leaders to distribute their men according to their own judgment, but criticized them for keeping, in some instances, an entire posse grouped in one place.

Who Shot Guards?

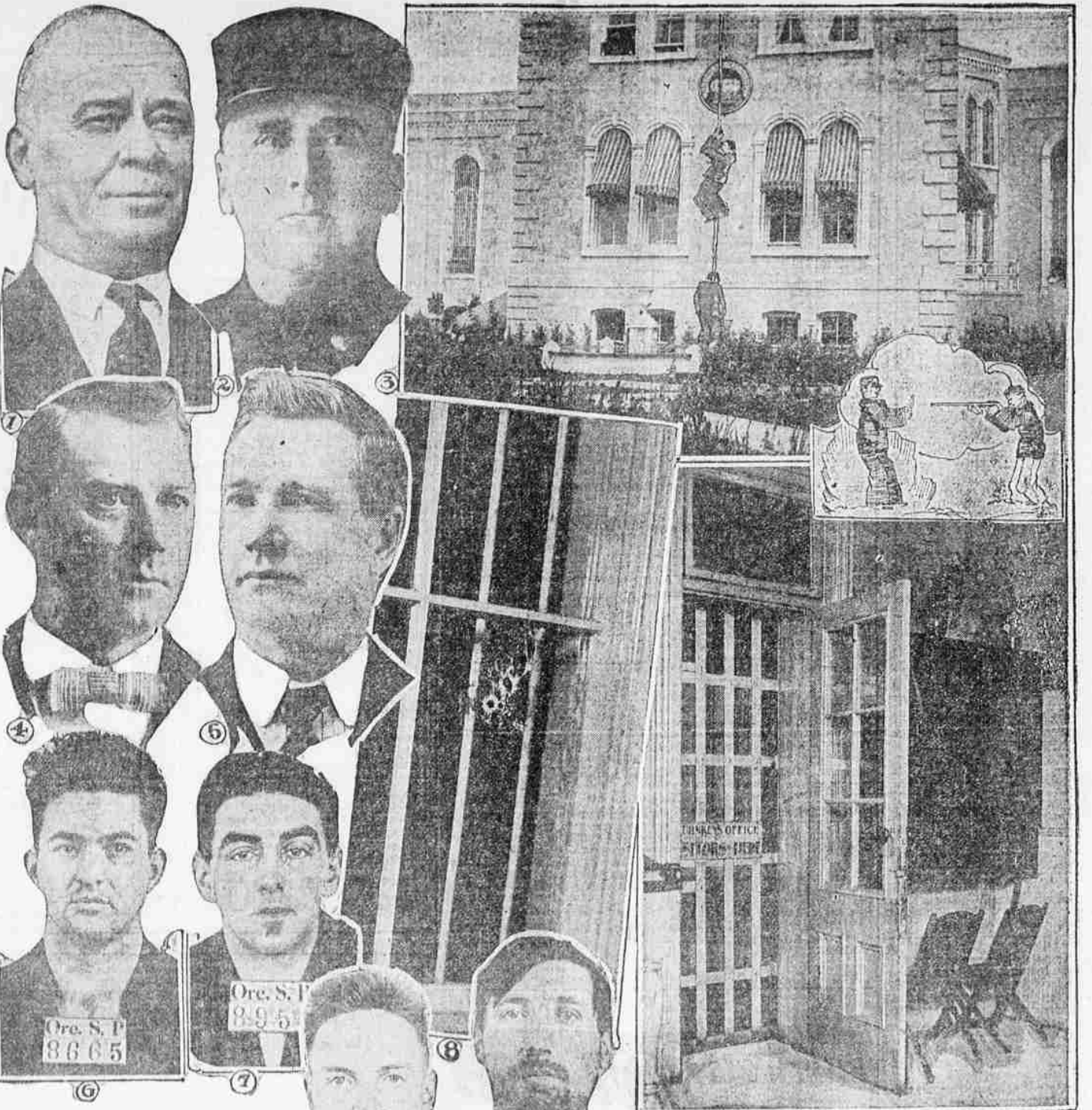
It will be the object of the coroner's inquest to determine, if possible, who of the escaping convicts shot the guards. The testimony of a large number of persons will be necessary. Coroner Riggs was unable to say this morning just when the inquest would be called. He was quite certain it would not be in the forenoon, and thought it might not be until tonight.

The object of the governor's investigation will be to determine whether carelessness and lax discipline on the part of the prison administration were responsible for the break. The governor discredits charges made by Oswald West and others that utter inefficiency was shown by Warden Dalrymple. However, he will make an effort to ascertain the facts. asked are: How were the convicts able to sneak dangers from files? How they ascended the pieces of rope that they applied together to let them down from the roof? Why they were able to step out of the line marching to the dining room? And how they were able to get to the roof and cut a hole in it?

Knives made from files are often found hidden away in the prison under all wardens. That is history. And as for knives and ropes, it is recalled that Harry Tracy and David Merrill had rifles hidden in the prison. Once before the roof was reached in the same way by the same men who got away Wednesday. This was when Jones, Kelly and others cut through the roof by gaining the fourth cell tier during the Johnson Smith regime. They were caught, however, before they got out of the yard.

House Is Plundered

Those in charge of the manhunt for the escaped convicts this morning said that they were reassured that the fugitives are still in the Pratum neighborhood by the report telephoned to the prison that the McIlhenny farm house, 7 miles south of Silverton, was pillaged during the night.

Mrs. McIlhenny reported that late in the night she and her husband heard someone enter the house. She says that they lay still in bed, and that the prowlers wandered over almost the entire house for nearly half an hour, but did not enter the bedroom. Nothing was taken except, perhaps, a little food the woman said.

Mrs. McIlhenny said she could not tell how many men were in the house, but that they made lots of noise and apparently did not care whether anyone heard them or not.

Jack LaFol, Her at the Oregon prison, who has just completed a book on "Rational Proof of Immortality" once was cunning enough to make an ingenious electrical device with which he was prepared to burn his way out of the prison. This was when Louis Compton was warden. In making the device strips of tin cut from cans, broom wire, common sewing thread and toilet paper were used, the latter for insulation. The machine was hidden in a can of sardines. Luckily it was found before LaFol had a chance to use it.

Politics Blamed For Escape; Pierce and Warden are Flayed

Portland, Or., Aug. 14—Gov. Oswald West has made inquiry of those who have made inquiry of those who could have told him of Dalrymple's total unfitness for even a subordinate position—let alone the head of the institution.

"Picture the situation! A long line of convicts marching in from the prison yard through the old chapel in the main building to the dining room for their evening meal. Four desperate men step out of line unnoticed. Where was Dalrymple? They walk unnoticed to their cells—an unheard-of occurrence. Where was Dalrymple?"

"Then, a little later, they walk out of their cells through the long corridor of the cell house—in broad daylight—to the stairway, which they mount and climb to the third tier. Where was Dalrymple?"

"They deliberately bore holes through the roof and remove a section large enough to permit their escape—in broad daylight. Where was Dalrymple? Those four men walk out on the roof in broad daylight and with a rope let themselves down one by one directly in front of the warden's office in broad daylight. This later act must have taken some time and should have at least attracted the attention of someone on the payroll at the institution."

"But where was Dalrymple? He was sitting leisurely at home, immediately across the road from the prison. The escaping convicts now mounted the steps leading to the arsenal when they were seen by Dalrymple, who was coming to the warden's office, not to capture escaping prisoners, but to get some letters he had forgotten. When he saw the four convicts, one of whom he says had a knife, he turned tail and ran—not taking time to shut and lock the prison yard gates—for home, where it appears he had a gun? Did he give the alarm or use his gun? No. He staid under cover until these four escapes overpowered and beat up Jim Noamith, the turnkey, unlocked the double door leading to the old chapel, through which they went back into the prison yard, where they proceeded to kill two guards and mortally wound the third. Where was Dalrymple?"

One of the boldest burglaries that has been perpetrated in Salem in recent years took place on Commercial street some time after midnight last night when burglars rifled the big glass show case that stands on the street in the open vestibule of the C. P. Bishop store.

A hole large enough to admit two men was cut in the glass, but it is not likely that the enclosure was entered. The burglars apparently reached in and raked out what they wanted. This was mainly sweaters, and it is probably that not more than half a dozen were taken.

The glass, after being partially cut, was smashed in, glass was scattered all over the interior.

The police report of Officer Smart indicates that the burglary was after midnight. As soon as Smart discovered it early in the morning he called Harry Rowe, merchant's patrolman, and Rowe said it had not been done at his midnight inspection.

The police are yet without a clue.

# ITALY SEEKING LOAN OF \$200,000,000 FROM U. S.

Turin, Italy, Aug. 14—(A. P.)—The financial writer of the Gazzetta del Popolo says that an American loan to the Italy government of from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000 at 5½ per cent is being discussed in financial circles. With commissions and other expenses the cost of such a loan would rise to 7 per cent, this writer says.

The Gazzetta del Popolo adds that something of this kind is necessary owing to the constant growth of Italian industries which require either a foreign loan or an increase in the currency, which would be dangerous for the national economy.
