Is why they didn't do something to stop our motor or something, if they thought we had Murray, instead of letting us go and reporting us. And after we did get away I don't see how the officers could miss us completely, the way they did.

Leaving the service station at the corner of State and Cottage streets, Mrs. Keene relates that she drove down State street, parked the car in front of the grocery store, went inside, made numerous purchases, entered the car again, and proceeded out North Commercial street, from the edge of town they took the road leading past the Keizer school house, making the entire trip to Wacona apparently without being seen by any officer of the law.

"And they're such wonderful detectives," Mrs. Keene remarked. "I'm dying to go back to that service station and tell them that

we got away with Murray. The report they turned in was a complete one all right. Never left out a move we made. Even told how I got out of the car to look at the gas tank. The gauge of our car doesn't work very well and when we get it filled they often fill it too full. That's why I got out to watch it being filled. First I had the man put five gallons in, then I looked into see how it was, and then I asked for five gallons more. Oh, they noticed everything I did all right."

Both Mrs. Keene and her husband are personally known in Salem. Her connection with yesterday's episode became known when she returned to Salem to see Mrs. J. M. Page and related the incident to her.

man they called Warden Dalrymple for instruction, being advised that the man should be turned over to the county officer. They brought him to Roseburg where fingerprints were taken and a thorough examination was made. Sanders has scars to match every one given in Kelly's description, but besides he has other large ones, which officers believe would have been mentioned in the description. In many respects, however, the resemblance is perfect. Fingerprints have been taken and the local authorities are getting in touch with prison officials to obtain a more thorough and complete description. In the meantime Sanders is being held on a vagrancy charge.

Warden Dalrymple of the state penitentiary here received a telephone call from Oakland this morning, stating that a man answering the description of Kelly, one of the trio who escaped Wednesday night, had stopped at a house and asked for food. The message indicated that he was being held at Oakland by O. H. White of that city, all the Oakland police force having departed to join the man hunt.

Dalrymple advised White to hold the man at Oakland pending the arrival of a deputy sheriff from Roseburg, who was sent word to proceed to Oakland.
