CARPENTER CASE GIVEN HEARING

B. E. Carpenter, who since August 1 has been held in the city jail pending disposition of a charge of possessing and transporting liquor, will be given hearing in the police court at two o'clock this afternoon. It was announced by Police Judge Poulsen this morning. He will appear to receive sentence upon a charge of possession to which he has pleaded guilty.

There have been many complications in the case including a motion made yesterday by City Attorney Charles Kowetz to dismiss the charge of transporting liquor after Carpenter had pleaded guilty to possession. The motion to dismiss has not been ruled on by Judge Poulsen who declared that he would make further investigation of the case before permitting the charge to be dismissed.

Carpenter is a California man who was arrested by Traffic Officer Edwards on the night of August 8. At the time of his arrest five five-gallon cans of loganberry juice and a 100-pound sack of sugar were found in his car.

ARMY PLANE DAMAGED IN LANDING AT ROSEBURG

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 18.—A forced landing here this morning of a Curtiss plane, one of a fleet of five, piloted by reserve officers from San Diego enroute to Seattle, was damaged slightly when it nosed into the ground upon landing. The good old days when "prisons was prisons" are coming back again says "Grandma" Brandenburg, who lived in Salem even before the penitentiary was built and who has seen wardens come and go. About the time that the first warden were built up Jack rabbits were a common sight on the streets but streets cars, paved streets and are lights resulted in a general exodus to the hills.

Now "Grandma" Brandenburg, like the rest of us, believes in signs. Early this morning, from her home at Wilson and Fir streets she saw a tall jack rabbit saunter slowly down Wilson street, only a few blocks from Salem's exclusive Lincoln hill district. She saw him raise up slowly on his haunches, take a general survey of the surrounding district, hesitate a bit, and then suddenly start speedily and directly for the penitentiary. "Grandma" hasn't decided whether the furry trier will form a little posse of their own to help out Warden Dal or whether they think all the guns are turned "con" ward and Salem is again safe. At least, they are coming back.

(Continued from Page One.) is captured. Chief Jenkins declared. All relief will be ordered out and will work double shifts, he said.

Police, knowing that the three men are reckless and apt to do almost anything, fear violence if any citizen, recognizing them, communitates that recognition to the trio. They doubt, however, that the fugitives will attempt any more sensational escapades.

"There's considerable method in their apparent madness," said Lieutenant Fred Graves. "They show their keenness by capitalizing the dread in which they are held, and it is that very dread of the three men which will make our hunt difficult."

"We understand from the Newmans that there is strife in the gang. Murray and Willos are constantly at sword points, and down in the woods near Pratum they were going to shoot it out, but Kelly stopped them."

"They quarreled incessantly yesterday in Newman's home, over trivial matters. It seems to be a battle for supremacy. Murray thinks he is entitled to the leadership of the gang, but Willos is a surly and morose fellow, wants it."

"I wouldn't be surprised if they shoot it out just as Tracey and Merrill did back in 1907."

When the three men left Newman and Leo Wilde, who had been kidnaped from Monitor early yesterday, Murray was still wearing the prison garb in which he escaped—a blue denim coat, inscribed on the lower left hand side with the letters "O. S. P."
