Portland, Or., Aug. 20.—The home nest of the Order of Owls in South Bend, Ind., has appealed to the government through the local federal court for a hearing to determine whether the Keep Growing Wiser Order of Hoot Owls, radio fanmakers, shall be permitted to keep the word "owls" in its name.

The complaint, filed Wednesday, cites in detail its reasons for believing that the "light and frivolous" character of the Keep Growing Wiser Order of Hoot Owls is injurious to the original Fraternal and Benevolent Order of Owls, and creates confusion in the minds of the public.

GLD CAP INN SOLD; IMPROVEMENT PLANNED

Portland, Or., Aug. 20.—Purchase of Cloud Cap Inn from the Mount Hood Trail & Wagon Road company by a group of Oregon citizens interested in the fuller development of the tourist and resort resources of the region, was effected today.

The group which has effected the purchase, and with which other interested citizens of the state will be associated, takes over the physical properties of the inn and the good will, with a view to working out plans for meeting the requirements of the forest department, which will call for an expenditure of about \$50,000 on additional improvements.

Cloud Cap Inn was founded 42 years ago by Capt. Stranahan & Cooper and in 1889 was bought by W. M. Ladd and his associates, and operated until 1919, when it was bought by Homer Rogers, who has headed the Mount Hood Trail & Wagon Road company since that time.

GIRL NARROWLY ESCAPES DEATH

Dallas, Or., Aug. 20.—Little Doris Kearns, 7-year-old daughter of Leslie Kearns of near Perrydale, had a narrow escape from death or serious injury Sunday afternoon when a horse leaped a fence near which she was playing. The hoof of the animal struck one of her feet, lacerating it so badly that it had to be amputated at the first joint.

Doris was treated by Dr. W. L. Pemberton of Dallas. She is doing nicely and shows no sign of infection. A variation of a fraction of a foot in the jump of the horse might have resulted in the girl being crushed. Men were attempting to drive the animal out of a field when it became excited and leaped the fence.
