PROMPT JUSTICE FOR MURDERER

Valentine, Neb., Aug. 22.—(A. P.)—Forty-eight hours after Frank Allen, transient laborer had shot from ambush and killed William Hecker, 40, bachelor rancher near Merriman, he was under sentence of life imprisonment. Allen was captured by an angry posse, consisting of cowboys and ranchers but was saved from any violence by the sheriff and county attorney who drove him overland for about 70 miles, landing him safely in the Valentine jail. He pleaded guilty and late yesterday was sentenced to life imprisonment at Rushville, near here. He begged for the death penalty and said he killed Hecker because "he put dope in my food and water."

ESCAPES DRIVEN TO KENTON SAYS PHILLIP CARSON

When Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelly and James Wilcox, escaped convicts, forced Leslie Newman of New Era and John Wilde of Monitor, to drive them into Portland from the Newman home, the boys did not deposit them in the downtown district as they reported to police, according to Phillip Carson, brother in law of Dr. Henry E. Morris of this city, who effected Murray's capture in Centralia last night.

"Murray told me last night that the boys drove them clear through Portland to Kenton and let them out there," said Carson this morning.

"Murray said that the reason he broke with Wilcox and Kelly was that he was out of their class—that Wilcox had a face that would brand him as a criminal anywhere. Murray said he was bound for Cuba."

"Murray said that they did not get any money from the taxi driver and his passenger the night they escaped here. He said that Kelly never would have been any shooting if Jones hadn't gone crazy and started shooting."

According to Carson the convict did not know it was he who had given him up until the train bearing the entire party was stopped at Koloa this morning to allow photographers to take pictures. Murray saw the photographers taking Carson's picture and said: "Did that turn me in. I'm going to hang and I wouldn't be in his shoes for a million dollars."

PROF. ERICKSON NAMED DEAN OF WILLAMETTE

Frank M. Erickson, professor at Willamette university since 1922, and dean of the Willamette summer school during the present season, was this morning appointed to continue in the capacity of dean of the college of liberal arts during the fall term, taking the place of George H. Alden, who has been dean since 1914. Dr. Alden acted as president during most of the past school year, taking the place of Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, who went east to recuperate his health. At the close of school Dean Alden took a trip east because of his health, which was impaired by his work last year.

"He has written to me, reporting that he is not recovering as rapidly as was hoped," said Dr. Doney this morning, "and it was decided to continue Dean Erickson in that capacity for the present at least. Dr. Alden will continue as head of the history department."

The decision was made by the executive committee of the board of trustees, which has jurisdiction in such matters.

At the executive committee meeting plans were also launched to improve the appearance of the campus by securing a professional landscape gardener. "The plan would involve tearing up practically all of our present lawn, many of our trees, and telling a landscape gardener to go ahead with it," said Dr. Doney today. "For years we have been troubled with the condition of our campus." The executive committee stipulated that funds must come from sources outside the regular income of the university.

CLARK CANDIDATE FOR UNITED STATES SENATE

Portland, Ar., Aug. 22.—The Portland Telegram says today: A. E. Clark, senior member of the law firm of Clark, Skidmore & Clark of Portland, will seek the republican nomination for United States senator.

He has no informed intimate friends, and it is expected that he will formally announce his candidacy within the next few weeks. He is now giving consideration to his platform.

TREATY RELATIONS

Washington, Aug. 22.—(A. P.)—Representatives to enforce the United States-Canadian treaty was agreed upon today by representatives of the two governments. They will be announced later.
