Word reached Salem this morning that William McGilchrist III, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William McGilchrist Jr., of this city, died Sunday while on the way to Yellowstone national park with his parents. Death came as a result of heart failure, according to the report reaching here, heart failure being caused by the low pressure at the high altitude which the party had reached. The McGilchrists left Salem, Monday, August 17, just a week ago, taking with them the two children, William and Josephine, aged 8 and Dr. Baber, whose home is in California, and who is a cousin of Mrs. McGilchrist. They will bring the remains of the young son with them, and funeral services will be arranged after their arrival here.
