

TAMMANY RULE IS ATTACKED BY REPUBLICANS

New York, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Tammany's joint responsibility with Mayor Hylan for eight years of misrule is the keynote of the republican mayoralty campaign.

Meanwhile Tammany leaders are pounding the mayor for trying to blow a hole in the ground with hot air instead of digging subways with shovels and mention of W. R. Hearst and Governor Smith is made frequently.

For seven and one half years the mayor and state Senator Walker, his Tammany opponent for the democratic nomination have slept in the same political bed, Frank D. Waterman, regular republican designee for mayor, said at his first rally last night. Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, delivered the notification speech. Citizens of New York, he said, have been compelled to hang their heads in shame because of the volcanic eruptions of ignorance, vulgarity and misrepresentation from the city hall. Dr. Butler took a shot at a bivouac of blue laws.

Mr. Waterman said: "Petty graft rolling up to \$500,000 has been taken from push cart peddlers, that more than \$6,000,000 worth of city contracts has been let without bidding and that murders had increased from 240 in 1918 to 315 in 1924."

Senator Walker, Brooklyn, frequently referred to William Randolph Hearst, Mayor Hylan's backer.

The Tammany candidate pledged himself to abide by the results of the primaries and called the man who didn't, "yellow" and a "quitter." He took pains to mention Mr. Hearst, has revived speculation as to the publisher's plans for supporting Mr. Hylan as an independent.
