## DALLAS COUPLE MARRIED SIXTY YEARS SUNDAY

Dallas, Or., Aug. 28.—Polk county's oldest married couple will celebrate on Sunday, August 30, the anniversary of their wedding held just 60 years ago. They are Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Dashiell of Dallas and they were married in Polk county August 30, 1865.

The Dallas Christian church, of which they are members, is joining with Mr. and Mrs. Dashiell in celebrating the event and has arranged an all-day service to which all the older residents of the city and community are invited. A basket dinner will be served at the church at noon with Mr. and Mrs. Dashiell and their family as honor guests.

The couple are the parents of 11 children, eight of whom are living. They have 33 grandchildren, 19 great grandchildren and two great great grandchildren. A

number of them will be in Dallas to celebrate with Mr. and Mrs. Dashiell.

Mr. Dashiell is in his 86th year. He was born at Louisville, Kentucky, July 27, 1840. Mrs. Dashiell, a member of the pioneer Campbell family, will be 79 in October.

The family history has been traced back to 1680 in France, their native land. They were Huguenots and in 1663 fled to the north of England to escape persecution under Louis XIV. They later came to America, settling in eastern Maryland, where members of the family still reside. Others have scattered to every state of the union. General Winzer, commander of the American forces at the battle of Bladenburg just before the burning of Washington, D. C., by the British in 1814, was a member of the family.

Mr. Dashiell's father was born in Baltimore in 1796 and witnessed the bombardment of Fort Mifflin, which inspired the "Star Spangled Banner."

Henry L. Dashiell, an older brother of Mr. Dashiell, was a union cavalry officer during the Civil war. He was ambushed in Missouri and received three bullet wounds, one of which was deflected from his heart by a book in his pocket.

Mr. Dashiell was taken to Iowa

when a boy of six years. In 1859 with two older brothers he joined the Pike's Peak gold rush. In 1860 he came to Oregon, settling in Umatilla county as a rancher and trader. He came to the Willamette valley a few years later.

The following are the eight surviving children of Mr. and Mrs. Dashiell. All were present 10 years ago for the golden wedding anniversary of the couple: E. L. Dashiell of Oakland, Cal.; George Dashiell, H. P. Dashiell, R. E. Dashiell and Mrs. Elsie Hergenholmer all of Sedonia, Wash.; W. C. Dashiell of Marlin, Wash.; H. E. Dashiell and Mrs. Clara Singletary, both of Dallas.

Kenneth Gray came home from Oakridge, Tuesday, with a badly cut knee due to an accident while getting out piling.

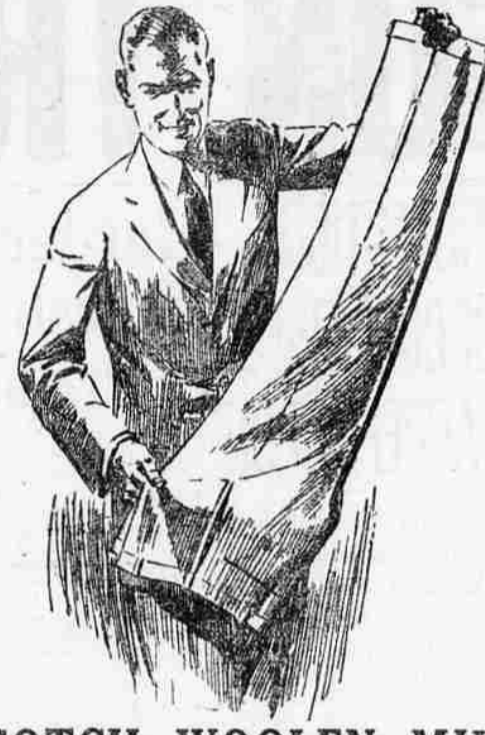
Mrs. G. B. Roland and daughter visited in Marion, Thursday.
