TAX REVISION BILL TO BE RUSHED THROUGH

Washington, Aug. 27.—(A. P.)—Plans are being perfected by the republican leaders in the senate to expedite action by the finance committee when the tax revision bill reaches it from the house.

Senator Curtis, republican, floor leader, a member of the committee said today before leaving for his home in Kansas that he intended to return early in October to follow the hearings which will be held by the house ways and means committee beginning October 19. Republican members of the senate committee, he said, planned to follow closely the house committee hearings and home debate so hearings could be begun

as soon as the bill reached his committee.
