that there has been talk to that effect, but as yet there has been nothing definite take place. J. C. Nelson, high school principal, stated last night this morning that no definite action would be accepted, "if high school students belong to them, and they are generally known among our high school student body, they are obviously high school clubs, no matter what they may claim," says Mr. Nelson.

Dramatic Society

Some attention has been directed toward the Siskiyoh dramatic society, at present considered the most doubtful of those left in existence by the board's action. Nelson stated today that in his opinion membership will probably have to be placed entirely in the hands of the faculty advisor, with authority to select members solely on the basis of dramatic ability and industry. The present custom of electing members of the society by popular vote of society members is not in accord with the principles adopted by the school board, he believes. Other high school clubs will probably remain as they are, already having been put upon a basis such that their members are selected by means other than ballot.

## STECK'S GAIN OF VOTES OVER 1000

Washington, Aug. 29.—(A. P.) Whether Senator Smith W. Brockhart, republican, or Daniel F. Steck, democrat, is to occupy hereafter the senate seat from Iowa now held by the former will hinge upon the verdict pronounced by the electorate itself on the validity of more than 7,500 ballots which have been challenged and laid aside during the recount here.

In the course of the recount, which probably will be concluded tomorrow or Monday, Steck has made a gain of upwards of 1,000 votes, counting both contested and uncontested ballots. This gain, if adjudged valid, would still leave Brockhart a few hundred ahead but far more than enough challenged ballots to turn the trick either way repose in the investigating committee's pigeonholes for future decision.

Aberdeen, Wash., Aug. 29.—Layman attending the western conference of the Norwegian-Danish Methodist church last night voted unanimously to unify the Methodist Episcopal church with the Methodist Episcopal church, South. The clergy-men of the conference turned in an unanimous vote on the same project yesterday morning. The conference here embraces churches of five western states and British Columbia.

The storm has caused some delay, and the flagship Peary now expects to reach Umanak, Greenland tonight. From that point the explorers will visit Godhavn to study the Norse ruins. The Peary reported yesterday that with good weather she expected to reach Umanak last night.
