CHINESE APOLOGIZE FOR JAPANESE DEATHS

Tokyo, Japan, Aug. 31.—(A. P.)—The reply of the Canton Chinese government to the protest of the Japanese against the killing of Japanese marines, expressed profound sympathy for the killed and wounded and assures Japan there was no hostile intention behind the action. Receipt of the reply was announced today by Japanese navy office.

The three men killed were in a motorboat making its way from a Japanese cruiser off Canton to a Japanese steamer which was aground. The Canton reply explains that gunners who opened fire on the Japanese motorboat were unable to distinguish the Japanese flag because of darkness. The men in charge of the Chinese fortress, the reply explained, were under orders to forbid boats from passing in the night, although no notice of this rule was served on the power.
