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RELATIONS WITH MEXICO FRIENDLY

Mexico City, Sept. 2.—(A. P.)—The United States and Mexico are walking the path of cordial and sincere understanding and it is the intention of Mexico to use her utmost endeavors to augment this friendship.

This statement was made last night by President Calles in his address to the members of congress at the opening of the new session. He also declared that the present prospects were that Mexico would resume the payment of her foreign debtors "within the shortest possible period consistent with certain unavoidable national needs which must be fulfilled first."

The president said the situation of tension which grew out of the statement issued by Secretary of State Kellogg in Washington last June had been cleared up in a friendly manner.

In his address the president urged legislation to restrict permits to foreigners and foreign corporations to own water land and sub-soil rights—mining property and oil lands—until article 27 of the constitution dealing with such lands is fully interpreted.

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GASOLINE SALES BREAK RECORD

The July distribution of gasoline in Oregon, according to a statement made yesterday by Secretary of State Koser, was 11,277,503 gallons, which is an excess over the sales for any one-month period in the history of motor vehicles in this state. The heaviest previous month was July, 1924, when 9,692,402 gallons were sold. Distillate sales in July were 334,533 gallons, which did not break a record.

Taxes received by the state on

July motor vehicle fuel sales totaled \$346,694.40. To date taxes from this source have returned to the state a total of \$2,408,400.01.
