Echoes of the national convention of business and professional women held in Portland, Me., in July were brought to Salem last night when one of the local delegates to the national meeting, Mrs. LaRue Ross, gave the Salem club a resume of her experience and her impressions of convention. Mrs. Ross told of the trip that she and Dr. Mary C. Purvine took together, she told of their experiences in Chicago, New York and Boston, and she recounted her impressions of the convention itself.

Oregon members of the national federation of business and professional women's club took an active part in the seventh annual convention. Miss Adella Prichard, a member of the local club, who served as national president for the past two years, turned over to her newly elected successor, Mrs. Olive Joy Wright of Cleveland, Ohio, the reins of office. The convention was one of the best in history and during the past year 168 new clubs were added with a total membership of 45,041. 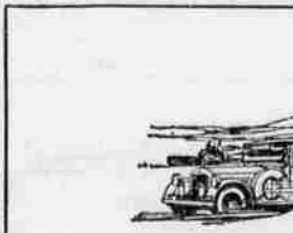
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Chemeketa chapter also has ten non-resident members and a waiting list of four.
