

PORTLAND EGG CONFLICT TERMINATES

EGGS GO UP WHEN FACTIONS GET TOGETHER

Portland, Sept. 3.—The so-called "egg war" between members of the dairy exchange, that threatened the local market for the past two days is over. Peace has been declared and the exchange quotations are again the official Portland prices.

Today the market is 1/2 to 2 cents higher with extras again at the 42 cent level on the dairy board. Flocks are up a cent at 33 cents and pullet eggs are posted 2 cents higher at 37 cents. Current receipts are a half cent higher at 33 1/2 cents.

Receipts are moderate in this market and buyers are grabbing all offerings. Some short held stocks are coming out of the cooler. The local butter market is in a good healthy condition with a brisk demand for all lines of butter. It is doubtful, however, if there will be any change made in price in the near future.

Seventeen cents is freely paid for choice light calves along 2nd street. Receipts are light and the call brisk. Fancy veal will occasionally bring 17 1/2 cents. Hogs held about steady at 18 1/2 to 19 cents.

PRUNE DRYING SOON TO START IN VALLEY

Prune drying in this locality is expected to start in a few days and indications are that more prunes will be dried in this section than originally expected because of the prunes being larger than anticipated. The market on Italiane still continues inactive.

Drying has been progressing in the Umpqua district but it is expected drying will not be overy heavy there as a considerable quantity was shipped out green.

CORN JUMPS UP 5 CENTS BUSHEL

Chicago, Sept. 3.—More than five cents a bushel jump in corn prices took place today. Quotations in September delivery of corn rose to 99 1/2, as against 94 1/2 to 94 1/2 at yesterday's finish. Reports of crop deterioration from excessive heat and drought came from a wide area.

Corn prices, 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents higher, December 84 1/2 to 85, were followed by additional upturns with September at 97 1/2, ordinary reaching distance of 11 a bushel.

Wheat started at 1/2 cent decline to 1/2 cent advance, December 1.51 to 1.51 1/2, and May 1.54 1/2 to 1.55 1/2, the market scored material gains all around.

After opening unchanged at 1 1/2 cents higher, December 41 1/2; oats made a slight general advance.

Influenced by hog values, the provision market was easy. Corn closed buoyant, 2 1/2 to 5 cents net higher, December 87 1/2 to 87 1/2.

PICKING OF FALL PEARS UNDERWAY

The Wallace pear orchard across the river produced 139 tons of fruit this year, when under normal conditions it produces approximately 200, according to Paul H. Wallace. All of the pears were handled through the Northwest Fruit Producers company.

Fall pears are now being picked at the orchard, including Clatsop, Comice and Rose varieties. Before the big freeze of a number of years ago the orchard produced as high as five cars of the fall pears, but these dwindled to three cars and this year it is considered that a full car will be a fortunate goal to reach.

Paul Wallace attributes the shortness of the crop this year to unfavorable weather in the spring when there was a period of cold, rainy days which it is believed interfered with pollination.

HOP PICKING BY WEIGHT CUTS IN ON PICKERS' PAY

Hop pickers at the Livealey Lake brook yard found out in about 20 minutes after they started picking this year that the new hop weight law "gyped" the pickers and worked in favor of the yard owner, but regardless of that fact Livealey issued instructions that pickers should be paid their full amount.

As a result the pickers at the yard are picking by weight as provided by law, but are getting paid by the box.

When picking started they were issued tickets to be punched at the rate of 50 pounds a punch. When weighing started it was found the hops were coming down light and the boxes weighed from 25 to 30 pounds. A box immediately went up from the pickers. However, instructions immediately went out to pay the full 50 cents a box regardless of the weight.

Now the foreman walks about the place with a pair of stilts and on his arms to slip it under a box and go through the motion of weighing the hops but hands out the tickets at the regular price.

Were the hops paid for by weight for picking pickers on the yard would lose several thousands of dollars—and probably would quit.

LANSDOWNE SURVIVED BY WIFE AND CHILDREN

Cincinnati, Ohio, Sept. 3.—(A. P.)—J. K. Lansdowne, president of the Weir Frog company, Norwood, Ohio, is a brother of Lieutenant Commander Zachary Lansdowne, reported killed.

Lansdowne said that his brother was 36 years old and had a wife and two children, Mary 2, and Paul, 11, living in Lakewood, near Lakehurst, N. J., the naval air base.

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JONATHAN APPLES NEARLY RIPE ENOUGH FOR PICKING

Jonathan apples are coming on rapidly, reports Charles Anderson of Young & Wells and Winter Bananas and Grimes also are making good progress toward the picking stage. Anderson says that the packing season probably will start a little early here this year as weather conditions have been excellent for ripening.

L. W. Wells is expected in town early in the week when it is likely some definite announcement will be made as to when the firm will start its operations here and in other points in the valley.
