

YOUTH ADMITS HANDLING COIN OF DAYTON BANK

McMinnville, Or., Sept. 4.—What may prove an entering wedge to further revelations about the Dayton bank robbery of March 18 was revealed here when Euel Martin, 26, of Carlton admitted that he handled some of the stolen money. When quizzed by District Attorney Nott, Martin stoutly denied that he knew the money was stolen when he received it from Joyce Thomasen, who robbed the bank and was killed in July after an attempt on a Vancouver, Wash., bank.

William Mattson, 18, arrested Monday at Keosauqua for complicity in the Dayton robbery, was taken over the ground yesterday by Sheriff Manning. Mattson maintains he was an accomplice of Thomasen against his will. He insists that he did not share the stolen money. According to Mattson, Thomasen pointed a pistol at him and compelled him to drive his car. Mattson took Thomasen to the Herner farm northwest of Dayton, where the money was hidden until night, when it was dug up.

Mattson will be arraigned tomorrow before Justice Olds. A brother from Vancouver, Wash., has declared himself willing to furnish bail.

INSTRUMENTS FILED SHOW BUSINESS GOOD

Business in Salem and Marion county during the month of August, 1925, was more active than during any other August in history it is indicated by statistics showing the number of instruments filed showing business transactions taking place during the month. A total of 714 instruments were filed here during the last month, as compared with 702 filed during August, 1924, which was considered the banner year at Salem so far as business conditions were concerned.

The record of August of this year shows more than 150 more instruments filed than the same month last year, which brought in a total of 556. Of the month just closed, 225 of the instruments were deeds, indicating that many transfers of property, and 161 were mortgages. In July, 1925, there were 709 instruments filed.

BOOM COMPANY RATES ORDERED SUSPENDED

The public service commission yesterday issued an order permanently suspending as unjust and unreasonable the rates, rules and practices filed June 4 by the Middle Ford Boom company. The following are declared in lieu of them to be just rates:

For all logs coming into or

placed or handled in the waters of the middle fork of the Coquille river below the mouth of Myrtle creek, the sum of \$1.50 per thousand feet.

For all logs handled or coming into the waters of middle fork of the Coquille river above the mouth of Myrtle creek and at or below the mouth of upper Rock creek, \$1.75 per thousand.

For all logs handled or coming into the waters of middle fork above the mouth of upper Rock creek the sum of \$2 per thousand.

5 MILE STRIP MARKET ROAD NOW FINISHED

Dallas, Or., Sept. 4.—A five-mile section on the Butler hill-Wallace bridge market road was completed Wednesday, according to County Engineer Howe, with the spreading of the final coat of fine rock. This section extends from the foot of Butler hill to Buell and trons over a formerly impassable stretch of winter road. It provides easy access to Dallas for the Buell district.

The cost of the road, according to Mr. Howe, is about \$32,000. When the remaining stretch from Buell to the Wallace bridge is completed a large additional territory will be served and the most direct coast route for Salem and Dallas will be established, for it taps the Tillamook highway about two miles west of Willamina at a point only 17 miles from Dallas.

With the completion of the rocking of the graded stretch of market road the county has begun rocking the Red Prairie road extending north from the top of the Butler hill toward Sheridan.

The location of the Butler hill route caused one of the bitterest fights ever waged in the county. Echoes of it are still being heard in the mileage re-fund suits now in court, while it is intimated that other ex-county court members may be made defendants in re-fund suits.

HEARST-SMITH VERBAL DUEL IS FIGHT FEATURE

New York, Sept. 4.—(A. P.)—Clashes between Governor Smith and William Randolph Hearst in the primary campaign continue with references to "Billingsgate," "bull," and "various other characterizations."

In a letter from Los Angeles published today, Mr. Hearst describes an attack by the governor as a "vulgar tirade that any resident of the alcoholic ward of Bellevue could have written."

Mr. Hearst insisted that the governor met W. G. McAdoo at the Ritz and agreed on Davis. He called the governor "Alibi Al."

Mr. Hearst said he was an independent in politics and that Governor Smith inadvertently told the truth in declaring the publisher was not a democrat.

"I cannot be a democrat," Mr. Hearst wrote, "while a squalid, venal, trafficking Tammany boss poses impudently as the democratic leader of New York city."

The governor, after describing the publisher's letters as "bull," referred to them at a rally as shipments of "bull" to New York and proceeded:

"What man can talk to him (Hearst) in any kind of language except Billingsgate; what man can talk to him in any other language except the kind that you would expect to find in the alcoholic ward because that is his surroundings at all times."
