Woman's Club Year Book Ready

The Salem Woman's club formally opens its twenty fifth year next Saturday at the clubhouse on North Cottage street with Mrs. Wm. Fordyce Fargo, chosen last spring to succeed Mrs. C. K. Spaulding, last year's president, occupying the chair. The club year book, just off the press and distributed today, contains a complete resume of the coming year's programs. The membership roster now has a total of two hundred and forty one names.

Delegates of the local club to the convention of the Oregon federation of women's clubs in Marshfield last spring will give echoes, edglights and their impressions of the convention at the meeting next Saturday. The program also calls for forecasts of the year's work by the chairman of the various standing committees.

Addresses will be given to the club during the year by Miss Eleanor Statter, art reference assistant in the Portland library, by Miss Jesse McGregor, chairman of the scholarship loan board, by Mrs. Sadie Orr-Dunbar, president of the Oregon federation of women's clubs, by Mrs. T. S. Roberts, Dr. G. C. Bellinger, Mrs. G. J. Frankel, state treasurer of the federation, by Professor Albert R. Sweetser, botanist at the University of Oregon and Mrs. A. J. French of Carlton, well known ornithologist, and by Frank Irvine, editor of the Oregon Journal.

Club members will observe red letter day for the benefit of the scholarship loan fund the last Wednesday in January and during the year three benefit affairs will be given for the club's scholarship fund. A silver tea will be given on October 16, a benefit dramatic recital on December 4, and a bridge tea on January 27. On November 6 the club will join the Daughters of the American Revolution in giving a reception in honor of the Cosmopolitan club of Willamette university.

In addition to the program for each meeting of the year the club year book contains the list of officers of the general federation of women's clubs and of the Oregon federation, a list of the present officers of the local clubs, the past presidents, the honorary members, the directors, board of trustees and building committee and the names of the house committee and the chairman and personnel of all of the standing committees for the year.
