

DAIRY PRODUCTS TREND UPWARD; FEED ADVANCES

Portland, Sept. 5.—Local dairy markets displayed a good healthy tone at the end of the week with prospects of a continued upward trend. Offerings of butter, eggs, and cheese are well taken and stocks are limited.

The egg market closed a cent higher with extra again quoted at 42 cents on the exchange. Firsts were bid a cent higher at 39 cents with pullets and current receipts steady at 37 and 35 cents respectively. Not enough fresh eggs are coming to meet this market's requirements and some short held stocks are being pulled out of the cooler.

Cheese butter quotations held unchanged in the closing session of the local market but the undertone is firm with a good outlet for high grade stocks. Even ordinary butter is being well taken. Extra 25 contained a fifty cent level throughout most of the week with standards at 49 cents and prime firsts at 47 cents. Prints held firm at 53 cents with fat offered at 52 cents.

Live poultry and country dressed meats show little change in values. Choice light hogs generally steady at 18 to 19 cents with choice light veal 16 to 16 1/2 cents. Occasionally a real fancy animal will bring a half cent premium over these prices.

All lines of poultry are moving out good. Spring chickens at 25 and 26 cents with little choice shown between white and colored breeds. Hens selling steady at 15 to 24 cents and white pekun ducks 23 to 24 cents. Poultry arrivals were limited this morning.

Portland millers have announced an advance of \$1 a ton in feed corn to \$56 effective today.

Hay markets slightly firmer with buyers offering \$15.50 a ton for oat vetch and \$19 to \$19.50 for alfalfa f. o. b. local team track. Other lines of hay are unchanged.

WHEAT AND CORN BOTH LOWER

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Wheat opening prices 1/4 to 1 1/2 cent lower, December \$1.59 1/4 to \$1.51, and May \$1.52 1/4 to \$1.53 1/2, were followed by something of a rally and then by a decline.

Opening at 1/4 to 1 1/2 cent decline, December \$2 to \$2 1/4 the corn market held near to the initial figures, but then recovered much of the loss.

Oats started unchanged to 1/4 cent lower, December \$1 1/4 to \$1.22, and held near to the initial figures. In line with hogs and corn, the provision market was easy.

Wheat closed weak, 1/4 to 1 1/2 cent net lower, December \$1.58 1/2 to \$1.50 1/2, and May \$1.54 1/2 to \$1.54 1/2.

Corn closed irregular, 1/4 cent lower to 1/4 advance, December 86 to 86 1/2.

Liveley Buys Collins Fuggles at 23 CENTS

J. C. Collins has sold his crop of fuggle hops for 23 cents to T. A. Liveley & Co. This is the highest price paid in this district this season, so far as known, says the Independence Enterprise.

Mr. Collins had 12 acres of fuggles, making 87 bales, or nearly 1500 pounds to the acre. From this year last year Mr. Collins harvested 29 bales.

V. M. DeCoster probably had the heaviest yield of early hops in the Independence district. From 33 acres he secured 45,000 pounds. This is close to a ton to the acre and is regarded as an exceptionally heavy yield for early hops.

Shoper & Patton and Ralph Portfield have sold their 1925 crop of cluster hops to the Wolfe Hop company of Portland. The price was 19 cents, which has been the top price for this season, and the same company recently contracted a portion of the Shoper Bros. hops at this figure.

The belief has been expressed that there will be a good crop of fuggle hops this year. Purchases here indicate that the hop market is stiffening.

Picking of early hops was finished at the Virelch Thursday, Mr. Rose, the manager, announces that the crop is exceptionally fine and the yield heavy.

Picking of late hops was also started Thursday. The quality of everything is moving along smoothly is the statement of the management.

PRUNE DRYING BEGINS TUESDAY

Active prune picking for drying is expected to start up next Tuesday. Picking has been going on for the canneries. Prune growers are discovering that this crop is not panning out as good as expected as the prices are on the outside of the trees and not bringing in the yield that was first looked for.

Reports from Myrtle Creek are to the effect that they are drying pretty well there and the quality is turning out the finest in years and that size are good. The prunes are drying out heavy.

The market generally continues quiet on both Italians and peaches. Reports from Hamburg are to the effect that the Russian prune market is slightly weaker.

PRUNES USED IN PLUG TOBACCO

Few people know it, but the Oregon prune has an outlet which takes care of a large share of the supply and a considerable quantity of smaller sizes in the manufacture of chewing tobacco. A number of packages here ship a car or two each to tobacco companies directly every year for this purpose. So far this business has not materialized to any extent this year as far as is known.

The prunes are used in adding a sweet flavor to the tobacco plug and also assist in making up the consistency of the tobacco which holds the plug together so that it fits the receptive mouth.

JAPS CAN OWN BUILDINGS BUT NOT OREGON LAND

Japanese residents of Oregon may own business or residence buildings in this state, but not the land on which they stand. They may, however, lease such land. This is the opinion of the attorney general's office, based on the Oregon law and a treaty between the United States and Japan. The opinion was asked by District Attorney Beddingfield of Coos county.

TIDEWATER DEFINED TO MEAN TIDE WATER

The term "tidewater" in Oregon is defined by an opinion of the attorney general to mean any river or stream running into the Pacific ocean, its bays or inlets, as far up the stream as the stream is affected by the ebb and flow of the tides. The opinion was asked by the state game commission with reference to the law allowing an open season on trout 10 inches or more in length during the months of December, January, February, March and April in all tidewaters.

75 TEACHERS AT WOODBURN FOR INSTITUTE

Woodburn, Sept. 5.—The week of institute for the special help of Marion county primary and rural teachers at Woodburn, held under the leadership and direction of county superintendent of schools, Mrs. Mary Fulkerson, closed Friday afternoon at 3:30. The prospect was successful beyond Mrs. Fulkerson's highest hopes. "The most wonderful thing to me," she said, "about the whole week's work was the continued high attendance in view of the fact that it was purely voluntary. Simple announcement had been made that the institute would be held and we expected perhaps twenty."

The first morning's session was held at the East Woodburn grade school and as three times the number expected came, the high school was thrown open to them. There one of the largest classrooms was used and tables in the hall made use of for exhibits of neat work under Miss Margaret Scollard's direction and health education instruction, assembled by Miss Anne Simpson of the Marion County Child Health Demonstration.

The total enrollment for the week was 75 with a daily average of 48 in attendance. This count excludes occasional visitors.

Mrs. Fulkerson modestly attributes the success of the week not to her leadership but to the fine spirit among the Marion county teaching force. It may be said for Mrs. Fulkerson's plans that they were thorough enough and big enough to command the interest and sustained attention of the unexpectedly large number enrolling.

Mrs. Fulkerson expressed herself as greatly pleased with the cooperation and team work of her teachers whenever she asked that work be done. It has been such that she is able to make requests and assignments with the complete faith that those who promise the work will fulfill their promises.

Besides the primary class demonstration by Superintendent Fulkerson and neat work, discussions and exhibits by Miss Scollard, of special moment was the presentation of the Marion County Health Demonstration headed by Dr. Walter Brown, who with his associates interpreted the working out of his theory that school children are highly worth saving from disease and handicap. Special instruction with regard to the work the demonstration has been placed in the county for was given by Dr. Brown and by Miss Amelia Perry, Miss Eleanor Thompson, director of nursing, Dr. Stella Ford Warner, director of medical attention and by Miss Anne Simpson, director of health education. This group of workers are in earnest about their work to get out of school children the best of health and service to the teachers and pupils of Marion county and are making preparation with the aid of seven trained nurses assigned to the seven groups of school districts, under the direction of Miss Thompson to reach every need presented to them.
