

FOUR HOME RUNS GIVE SENATORS CLOSE CONTEST

Outside of six home runs, four for the Senators and two for Toledo, the game yesterday afternoon on the Oxford park diamond was a good one. The score would have read 1 to 0 in favor of the Senators had the homers been eliminated. The two Toledo homers accounted for the four tallies for them but the Senators were not to be outdone and sent eight runs across to beat them 8 to 4. Bouton was the only man to cross the plate without the assistance of a homer. In the second frame after Barbara had homed he stretched a double into a triple and scored a minute later. He started to steal home and when Strickmeter threw to catch him at the plate the ball went so high that Bouton had scored before it came down.

Neither side scored in the first inning although both had men on bases. In the third the locals scored two runs. Barbara brought the crowd to its feet with a homer over the right field fence for the first score of the game. Bouton then settled onto one of Strickmeter's ball for a triple and scored a minute later when he started to steal and Strickmeter threw wild to home.

In the fourth frame the Senators kept right on with what they started in the third. Adolph, first man up went out at first and it was several men later before another one went out. Adolph's out raised a little dirt and when the dust had rolled away six tallies had crossed the plate. Reinhart singled and went to second when Quisenberry walked. Schackman cleaned the bases when he lapped on one of Strickmeter's balls for a home run over the right field fence. Edwards started things anew with a single into right field. Barbara, Salem hurler, came to bat and hit his second homer of the game over the right field fence scoring Edwards ahead of him. Bouton then fouled out to King. Proctor, not to be outdone by his teammates hit a homer over the right field fence. Maples got a hit and stole second. Adolph coming to bat for the second time of the inning walked but Reinhart flew out to Armstrong to end the hectic inning. This ended the scoring for the locals while the Toledo nine kept right on trying and after scoring one in their part

of the fourth on a homer by Robbins. Toledo shortstop, settled down to get a few more. In the eighth frame the Toledo team scored three more runs on Robbins' second homer. Quinn was safe when Bouton overplayed the ball and booted it. King was safe when the ball took a bad bound over Bouton's head. Armstrong was safe at first on a fielder's choice when Bouton threw King out at second. Robbins then strode to the plate and hit the ball so far over the fence that it is doubtful in the minds of those who saw it go over whether it is ever going to be found. Robbins two homers accounted for all of the Toledo scores.

Several nice plays were pulled off by the locals. In the second frame Adolph reached around and touched Stapleton at first when Maples throw drew him off of the base. In the third inning with a man on third and second and two down Edwards sent a beautiful peg to third to catch Quinn off of the bag. Quinn though Edwards was throwing to second and started to come home. Edwards whipped it down to third base instead and pulled the Senators out of a tight hole. The locals are playing the Toledo team again this afternoon at 3 o'clock, weather permitting.

MENTAL TESTS SHOW CONVICTS ABOVE AVERAGE

Gust Anderson of Salem, student at Northwestern university and who recently passed the Illinois state bar examination, has made a mental test of Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelley and James Wilton, who shot their way out of the state penitentiary August 12, and holds that Murray and Kelley are above the average mentally, while Wilton is below the average. Murray is 18.6 years old, Kelley 17 years and Wilton 12 years. William H. Lloyd, who killed Clinton I. Bann of Independence a few days ago by treacherously shooting him in an automobile, is given a rating of 16.9 years, which, says the expert, would entitle him to entrance as a freshman in any university.


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Anderson's report is to be handed the governor for such use as the executive may see fit. If the same basis of comparison could be made, Anderson says Murray's mentality could be compared with that of Leopold, the Chicago student-murderer. "He has an indomitable will, affable disposition and rapid mental response," says the report. "Emotional responses were intermittent." On the basis of his answers to questions his reasoning was rated above the average. In acquired knowledge he rated above the average high school student.

Kelley was described as having slow mental reaction, and the report holds that he would have been a good stenographer or clerk because he shows an aptitude for concentration. Emotional responses were deliberate, but active. Anderson has specialized in criminal psychology at Northwestern university and was present when the mental tests were given to Loeb and Leopold. The tests given the Oregon slayers were similar to those given the Chicago youths. Prof. Frank M. Erickson of Willamette university assisted Anderson in the tests.

FIRST PROSECUTIONS UNDER NEW STATUTE

Eugene, Sept. 7—First prosecutions in the state under the amendment passed at the last session of the legislature to the working men's compensation law, wherein anyone about to engage in a hazardous occupation must first notify the state accident commission, were conducted here last week. W. J. and J. L. Lopley pleaded guilty and were fined \$25 each.



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
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
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
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
