ASKS \$564.90 FOR BURNS SUFFERED AT CAMP GROUND

The city is faced with a claim for damages totaling \$564.90, presented to the city council last night by Mrs. Allen J. Mitchell in behalf of her husband who is at the city camp ground suffering from a severe burn suffered August 22 noon after the Mitchell had driven into the grounds in the evening. One of the city's camp tables overturned on Mr. Mitchell, causing a pot of boiling coffee to be spilled into his lap, causing severe burns about the abdomen and thighs. He asks damages at the rate of \$30 a day for lost time and also the cost of doctor's care.

Mitchell is an advertising man from Ohio. When the council questioned the value of his time at \$30 a day, Mrs. Mitchell said he was accustomed to earning more than that amount as an advertising man. This was also vouched for by a Miss Shaw, who accompanied Mrs. Mitchell. Miss Shaw is connected with the Hearst Newspaper Syndicate of New York and has a wide reputation as a writer.

Mrs. Mitchell excoriated Supervisor Purvine of the camp grounds. She said that when they arrived at the grounds in the evening, tired after a long drive, he did not even speak to them or extend any other form of welcome. When, after the accident, she hastened to him for information as to where she could get a physician, she declared Purvine was abrupt and gave her no satisfaction. Having noticed the Deaconess hospital near the grounds as they entered the camp, Mrs. Mitchell said she hurried there and was given medicine for first aid. Mrs. Mitchell, however, commented on the manner of financing the building of roads.

FEDERAL AIR PATROL OF FORESTS CEASES

Eugene, Or., Sept. 9.—The air patrol of the United States forest service with headquarters at Eugene, will be discontinued for the north Pacific district tomorrow owing to decreased fire hazards, according to orders received from the district forest office.

Lieutenant Lloyd Barnett, commander of the forest air patrol on the coast, with headquarters here, and Lieutenant A. R. Loomis and Alva R. DeGarcia will go off duty tomorrow with the breaking up of the patrol for the summer.

936 MILES OF IMPROVED ROAD NOW IN COUNTY

"Only a few years ago Marion county was a mudhole," was the declaration made by J. T. Hunt, county judge, who outlined the 5 years road building program completed in the county here last fall, in a speech before the Salem Rotary club this noon. Since the beginning of the program, Judge Hunt stated, there have been 614 miles of gravel road built by the county, 185 miles of macadam road and 149 miles of pavement.

"There are now only 237 miles of dirt road left in the county," he declared. "The last of the outlying towns, including Scotts Mills and Monitor, will soon be connected up by improved roads."

"The city of Salem may well afford to be liberal in this matter of road building," he continued, "since in many ways it works to the advantage of the large towns and to the detriment of the little towns. I think that Salem has been liberal in the matter of financing the building of roads."

One hundred twenty miles of paved road will be laid by the county within the next 5 years, Hunt indicated. The expense will be met by money appropriated by the state, amounting to \$55,000 annually, which must be matched by direct tax levy within the county.

"At the present time," said the judge, "I don't think there's a county in the state or on the coast better equipped so far as roads are concerned, than is Marion county."

Tom Kay, member of the Rotary club, added a few words to what Hunt had said, declaring that Multnomah county pays approximately one third of the money which goes for roads in Oregon, and receives benefits amounting to a much smaller fraction of the amount.

RAILROAD HEAD SAYS INCREASED RATE NECESSARY

Chicago, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Heads of two railroads of the northwest were the next witnesses in the west ern freight rate advance hearing before Chairman Clyde B. Atchison of the interstate commerce commission here.

Fred W. Sargent, president of the Chicago and Northwestern, started his testimony yesterday and finished it today. President Charles Donnelly of the Northern Pacific and W. H. Bremner, receiver for the Minneapolis and St. Louis railroad company follows him.

President Sargent of the Chicago Northwestern, virtual spokesman for 67 roads, in completing his testimony today based the application for a five per cent rate increase on what he termed the unremunerative returns and low basis of charges now allowed the western carriers.

He summarized the situation for the years 1923 and 1924 inclusive, as applied to the Chicago and Northwestern which he called a typical system with a low indebtedness, by presenting the following figures as reason for increased rates:

Maintenance of way expense increased 26 per cent.

Maintenance of equipment increased 165 per cent.

Transportation expenses increased 90 per cent.

Total operating expense increased 107 per cent.
