of the disaster announced by Chairman Butler of the house naval affairs committee.

Captain Heigen will be called to testify before the committee.

Mitchell To Probe

The committee Chairman Butler said, also will investigate the attack of Colonel William Mitchell on the administration of the air service in which he included the assertion that politics had dictated the Shenandoah flight was an effort to offset failure of the navy's Arctic and Hawaiian flights.

Colonel Mitchell, whose charges against the administration of the air service have brought the disciplinary forces of the war department into motion, is out with another statement that if the department wants to take disciplinary action on the grounds of insubordination there will be no defense on his part.

Such a thing as military discipline ceases "if superior officers are not that in fact but only in name."

Colonel Mitchell said, adding that to obscure the issue that he has raised of the "disgraceful condition" in aeronautics his proposition would be merely to "delude the public."

Charge Not Responsible

In his reply to criticism concerning the Shenandoah's flight Secretary Wilbur said the fact that the gas bags did not explode and were intact after the ship broke up, showed that the change in the escape valves was in no way responsible for the accident.

The contrary of Captain Heinen also is challenged by Lieutenant Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, navigator and surviving officer of the Shenandoah, who declared in a statement at Lakehurst, N. J., that Heinen's supposition was "absolutely unreasonable."

Rates By Steamer

The price quoted by the boat line has been 11 1/2 cents per 100 pounds, for any size shipment, on carload lots and less than carload lots. There will be no reduction in this price, Mr. Karr states.

The regular truck rate on the same goods is quoted at 15 cents per 100 for shipments in any amount. No notice has been filed with the public service commission of any reduction to meet the new rail rates.

According to the present notice filed with the commission by the railroad lines, the new rates will expire April 30, 1926. It is noted that the contrary is not given.

The new rate is considered an opening wedge in the effort which has been made here for the better part of a year to secure terminal rates on the railroad lines. Salem shipments, particularly to and from southern points, are higher than Portland shipments, prices being in general Portland prices plus the local rate from Portland to Salem, although freight is actually shipped directly from and to the depots here. Terminal rates,

Directly to Salem, would not only save local shippers thousands of dollars annually but make this city a distributing center in many ways on a par with Portland.

creating a city zoning and planning commission was recently enacted to study just such problems as these and Mayor Gleay has announced that the appointment of the members of the commission will be made within a short time, the ordinance now proposed would be in the nature of a temporary measure designed to serve as a safeguard until such time as the zoning commission can make a thorough investigation and prepare a permanent ordinance covering all building and zoning problems.

It is anticipated that the zoning commission will frame its recommendations with a view to providing for the future growth of the city, and will draft an entirely new building and districting code for the city.

It is hoped to have the temporary ordinance drafted and ready for submission as an emergency measure at the next regular meeting of the council.

CUT RATES TO PORTLAND ON CANNED GOODS

According to statement given out at the office of the public service commission, simultaneously with the reduction in rates, the required weight for a carload lot has been reduced to 40,000 pounds on both canned goods and dried fruit. The old requirement was 36,000 and 50,000 on canned stuff and dried fruit, respectively, that amount being required in a single shipment to secure the rate, which otherwise was 23 cents per 100 pounds. The rate for less than a carload lot has not been changed, it is stated.

Mr. Karr declares that an unloading charge at the Portland dock amounts to 2 cents per 100 pounds in the case of rail shipment, and about 2 1/2 cents more in case of delivery at Terminal No. 4.
