Music Club Announces Concerts

Coincident with the coming of fall and winter is opening of the concert season and the revival of interest in things musical. One of the first of Salem's musical organizations to announce its scheduled season is the Civic Music Club.

Four attractions will be brought to Salem during the winter by this organization. The first will be the return engagement of the Portia Mansfield dancers who won an enthusiastic audience when they appeared here last spring. Twelve solo and ensemble dancers are included in the troupe, all college trained, and each an artist. They will appear at a local theater something during the month of October.

In January the Civic Music Club will sponsor the second number in their series when Helen and Blanche Hodnett, famous duo singers, will give a complete concert. The two sisters have returned recently from long engagements abroad.

Carol Robinson, American pianist, so favorably received two years ago when she played here, will give a concert in March and Laurence Strawn, well known tenor, will give his concert during April.

Foremost among the pictures shown will be the prize winning collection from the Pacific international photographers' association held in San Francisco early this month. Members of the Pacific coast photographers' association will likewise be notably represented.

Course In Story Telling To Be Opened

Promising to be one of the most interesting sections of the Salem Arts league during the coming winter is the story telling section which Mrs. Lola Belle Bellinger will direct. Both her training and experience have fitted Mrs. Bellinger for leadership in this work and widespread interest followed the announcement that she would lead the classes. A number of the members of the Salem Woman's club who were in charge of the story hour at the playgrounds during the past summer are planning to join this section in preparation for story hour work next summer.

Mrs. Bellinger has completely outlined the work for the coming winter. She plans a series of nineteen lessons, the first to be held Wednesday, September 23, and to consist of an explanation of the course. The second lesson will cover the history of story telling and the modern revival. During the third meeting of the class Mrs. Bellinger will explain what stories can be told, how they should be prepared for telling, and finally how to tell them. The next class meeting Mrs. Bellinger will turn over to the class members asking three or four of them to tell stories.

The remainder of the tentative outline is as follows: fifth lesson, stories suitable for little children; the sixth on fairy tales; the seventh lesson will be another practice lesson; the next two class meetings will be devoted to a study of epics; tenth lesson, practice with a review of what has been presented; eleventh, myths; twelfth class, poems; thirteenth, review; fourteenth, real or possible stories; fifteenth, stories for special days, such as patriotic stories, hallowe'en and Christmas stories; sixteenth, review; seventeenth, stories for adults; eighteenth, miscellaneous with possible original adaptations; and nineteenth, and last class meeting, review.

All class meetings will be held in the educational room of the public library unless other announcements are made. The first meeting will be held on the fourth Wednesday of the month but the exact meeting dates in the future will be left to the decision of the section members.

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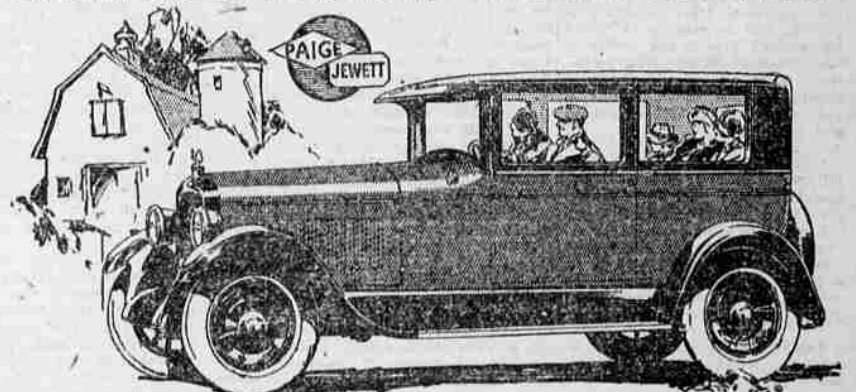
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
