saying he was going to call up a friend of his in Seattle and see if he could get some job. That from his remarks it understood he meant a bank job or holdup job.

"When we heard about two men being shot in Washington on a holdup job he told me that he had said he didn't do, that he had probably would have been mixed up with that, or words to that effect.

That at the time Murray was caught, Whitey told me he knew Carson and had stayed with him a few days in the Alder Hotel and told him about pulling a job and wondering why he didn't equal on him; that I believe it was the Aurora job he was speaking of. That about the time Whitey said anything about the jobs was when he was broke and laying around with nothing to do. That I make this statement freely and unflinchingly, without fear, threat, intimidation, hope, promise of reward or immunity.

Hoy's Statement. The statement made by Vernon Hoy, follows:

I, Vernon Hoy, being first duly sworn on oath, depose and say: That I met Clyde Watson "Whitey" a year ago last May and that I worked with him at the Big Creek Logging Camp; that I also am acquainted with a man by the name of "Blacky"; that at one time I met them when they were up at Knappa in a Flint car and they asked me to go up to Portland with them, but that I refused and went up on the train; that a day or two later I again met them in Portland and went up to their room and we sat drinking and playing cards; that at that time Blacky told me he had been in on the Aurora job and some other job in Washington; that Blacky also asked me to go to Seattle with them and help pull some jobs, but that I told them I did not want to go with them on anything of that kind; that "Whitey" told me that the two men were shot up in Washington in the bank holdup were friends of his; that I met "Blacky" in the middle of May, 1923, at the Ephraim Logging company near the town of Kelso; that I have never seen him since the above mentioned time in Portland in December, 1924.

reliable way.

If a pioneer already has some means of transportation at his disposal, well and good, if not he is asked to notify the Journal at the time he registers at the office and a car will be sent by the Fred M. Powell Motor company to bring him to the show and to take him home again after it is complete.

The show itself is of particular interest to pioneers in the northwest, dealing as it does with a period in northwest development in which they figured. Even the filming of the picture was accomplished only by means of experience which will bring a reminiscent smile to the face of many an old pioneer. The cast, numbering with its extras over 5000 persons, lived through the rigorous months on the Nevada desert and in the Sierra range, in tents and lean-to shacks, enduring the same hardships so far as the elements were concerned, as those experienced by the transcontinental pioneers they portray.

Three tribes of Indians were used in the picture, one of Cheyenne, one of Sioux and a third of Pawnees. The cast includes all nationalities, with a preponderance of Irish and Chinese, and in number mounts well into the thousands. Troops alone reach a total of 1000.

Hundreds of girls appear in the picture dressed in the picturesque hoop skirt and pantalette style favored by a generation which is, too rapidly, being forgotten.

The engines used in the film were the originals used by both railroads, and were especially loaned for the occasion.

STATE BOARDS MULTIPLY AS IF BY MAGIC

or some agency other than the governor.

"The total number appointed by the governor is 206 and the number appointed by some other agency than the governor is 15. The membership of boards and commissions named or designated by the constitution or by statute is 89. The membership of 16 of the total number of boards and commissions is composed entirely of state officers; of ten the membership is composed of both state officers and citizens, and of 35 the membership is composed entirely of citizens. Two of the boards and commissions exist under constitutional authority and 62 are the creatures of statute.

"The governor, by authority of either the constitution or statute, is a member of 18 boards or commissions, the secretary of state is 14, the state treasurer of nine, the superintendent of public instruction of six, the attorney general of four, the superintendent of banks of two, the state engineer of two, the adjutant general of one, and other state officers hold membership on ten boards of which the total officer membership is 25."
