

EGGS HIGHER; BUTTER STRONG FLOUR REDUCED

Portland, Sept. 12—Eggs closed strong in the local market with all grades working higher during the week. Pullets and current receipts are one cent higher today at 41 and 35 cents respectively. Other grades held unchanged at the closing session of the dairy exchange.

The butter market is strong with prime first cubes a cent higher on the exchange at 45 cents. Other grades posted at former quotations. The local market is actually short of butter with fresh arrivals hardly sufficient for requirements.

Country dressed meats were steady at the close. Receipts of both hogs and calves have been light along the street and prices were well maintained. Choice light calves 17 cents at close, best hogs 18 to 18 1/2 cents.

Live poultry receipts were light this week and the market cleaned up at the close. Demand has been good in all lines and prices ruled firm. Light hens 15 cents; heavy hens 24 to 25 cents; spring 25 cents and white pekkin ducks 25 cents. Broiler turkeys brought 25 cents on this market with old birds at 42 to 43 cents.

Local millers reduced the price of family patent flour 20 cents a sack today to \$8.60 a barrel. At the same time feed corn and oats declined \$1 a ton to \$25 and \$42 respectively.

Flares From the Flight

(By Associated Press.)
A journey that was begun with a speed of 80 miles an hour and was finished at two, so slowly that sharks could swim leisurely and keep pace, was told to "the American people" by Commander John H. Rodgers in the statement which he made public as the story of the San Francisco-Honolulu non-stop flight.

When the navy officials and the public were lamenting them as presumably dead and visualized them as the prey of the hungry, finny creatures that infest Hawaiian waters, the navy crew of the P-3 No. 1 still was alive and suffering, not for food or water, but for tobacco.

Honolulu heard—the five of them alternated "tobacco" on the three cigars that remained after the cigarettes had been consumed in the early hours of the great adventure.

They were 200 miles from their scheduled destination, figured along the route of flight and near 400 miles from the nearest land in the direction of the drift. Their radio was useless for broadcasting for want of generative power but they could receive.

The news of the terrible disaster to the Shenandoah broke in on the more routine details of the searching operations.

As his father had done before him when exploring the frozen north, for the navy years ago Rodgers carried a still at the urgent behest of his mother.

HOPS PROVING FINEST QUALITY, HEAVY YIELD

Very satisfactory progress is being made in the hop harvest. In some yards there has been a slight shortage of pickers, but taken as a whole labor conditions have been quite satisfactory, says the Independence Enterprise. Some of the pickers are not very well satisfied with the weight measurement, particularly in the case with the speedsters, and in spite of the fact that the prevailing rate is \$1.20 per hundred.

The harvest is revealing two very pleasing conditions: a fine quality of hops and a heavier yield than was anticipated. As to quality, Harry Ord of the E. Clemens Horst company says: "Our crop is superb." Others have expressed themselves similarly, all agreeing that the quality is of the very best. So far weather conditions have been very satisfactory and extreme care is being taken by the pickers.

Another very satisfactory condition is the evident demand for hops. Buyers have entered the field for future contracts at prices which will give the growers a nice profit. One grower has had a chance to contract his futures for the three coming years at 25 cents a pound and the price for spot futures and clusters continues to work upward. There is a feeling that a 25 cent market has possibilities of considerably higher prices.

E. M. Young expects to harvest a larger crop this year than last. The surprising part to Mr. Young is that owing to the market being off last spring he did not give his crop as much attention as he has this year. He has been content, yet in spite of this he says that he has a fine quality of hops and a heavy yield.

APPLE CROP SHOWS A GAIN

The commercial apple crop of the United States is estimated this year at 20,394,000 barrels, an increase of 1,807,000 barrels over the production of last year.

The government report just issued shows a gain of 50,000 barrels over the estimate of one month ago.

The total crop of the country is placed at 162,195,000 bushels, or about 17,000,000 bushels less than last year.

The condition of the United States crop is estimated at 22.5 per cent compared with 22 per cent on August 1. The Oregon crop condition is put at 62 per cent, the same as a month ago, Washington at 70 per cent, a loss of 2 per cent, and Idaho at 75 per cent, a 2 per cent gain.

62,295 CERTIFICATES AUTO TITLE ISSUED

To and including September 9, an aggregate of 62,295 applications for certificates of title to motor vehicles, under the provisions of a new law, had been examined in the automobile division of the secretary of state and approximately 50,000 certificates of title have been written and mailed to and including that date. Of the above total of applications examined 12,027 have been returned because of discrepancies or defects in title.

Round numbers about 125,000 applications for certificates of title have been received in the department and these are being examined and disposed of at the rate of between 2000 and 2500 a day. A large volume of applications for transfers of title have also been received and the first of these, numbering 79, were issued upon September 9.

REFERENDUM VOTE FAVORS BOX PICKING

A referendum vote by the 2000 or more hop pickers at the E. Clemens Horst company ranch shows that they are strongly in favor of picking hops by box instead of by weight as was prescribed by the last session of the legislature, says the Independence Enterprise. While all of the votes have not as yet been counted, due to a strike on the part of those who are attempting to get an expression from the pickers, the count so far shows that not a single picker favors the weight system.
