

IMPROVEMENT OF WILLAMETTE CAMPUS BEGINS

A plow will start turning the sod of the Willamette campus within a week. It was announced by President Carl Gregg Doney of the university, following a visit here of Henry Booth of Roseburg, who has charge of the projected work on the campus. Mr. Booth arrived here Friday, mapped out his plans, and left for Roseburg again Saturday morning. Dr. Doney arrived in Salem early Saturday morning from a meeting of the Columbia river conference in eastern Washington.

A number of trees have been marked by Mr. Booth for digging out. They are for the most part maples, and include about half of those in front of Eaton and Science halls. Work is expected to begin within a few days pulling out the trees.

The first plowing will be shallow, it is announced. Weeds with which the campus is infested at present, will be allowed to die. The second plowing will be deeper than the first, and followed by a thorough working over of the soil with a disc. After the ground is made smooth and level a top coat of commercial fertilizer will be spread over it. The original plan to sow rye and plow it under next spring, has been abandoned.

A number of trees, including the hawthornes along the walk by State street, will be planted this fall, Dr. Doney stated. It is planned to fill in some dirt around Music and Waller halls.

Henry Booth, who is a banker of Roseburg, is said to do landscape gardening as a hobby. He was on a committee which had charge of laying out the state capitol grounds some 15 years ago. His brother, Robert Booth of Eugene, is a prominent member of the board of trustees of the university.

HARTLEY SAYS LET FARMERS OF COUNTRY ALONE

Snobomish, Wash., Sept. 13.—(A. P.)—Roundly scolding the "legislative mania which has turned our heads and depleted our pocketbooks," in a message to visitors to the grange community exhibit being held here today, Governor Roland H. Hartley declared that the greatest favor the state can bestow upon the farmer is to "get off of his back and leave him free to go about his business unhampered by an army of regulators, investigators, inspectors, auditors and spectators."

Invited to speak on the "Relation of the Farmer to the State," the governor was unable to attend in person, as he was engaged at Ellensburg with his business survey. His message was addressed to R. D. Deselle, grange leader.

The farmer, Governor Hartley declared, is no different in his relation to the state than any other citizen, since the state is the product of the co-operative effort of all citizens, regardless of vocation or profession and deplored any tendency toward "group government." Participation in governmental affairs is as much the business of the farmer as his purely agricultural pursuits. Governor Hartley pointed out, as all government activity vitally affects the farmer.

NOEL INDICTED; RESIGNATION OF DOCTOR SOUGHT

Newark, N. J., Sept. 12.—With four indictments returned in New Jersey against Harrison W. Noel, confessed murderer and kidnaper of six-year-old Mary Dale, the resignation is sought of Dr. John Thompson, senior physician of the Overbrook, N. J., asylum for defectives, from which Noel escaped two months ago. The demand is made by the Essex county board of free-holders, which declared Dr. Thompson granted a virtual parole to Noel.
