It was one of the best opening meetings that the club has ever had. Mrs. W. F. Fargo, president, was in charge and the meeting opened with the club song "America, the Beautiful," arranged in a lower key by Mrs. T. S. Roberts, chairman of the music committee. Miss Maude Engstrom played the accompaniment.

Among the interesting routine work handled early for the meeting was the reminder by the board of directors, Mrs. C. P. Breithaupt, Mrs. U. G. Shipley and Mrs. H. T. Love, that any suggestion that any club member wishes to present before the club will be handled through them. They will represent club members before the club assembly.

One of the most interesting reports was that of Mrs. E. E. Fleher who is head of the child welfare division of the health committee. As Mrs. Fisher was representing Mrs. Fargo and the club at the Marion county health meeting held on the same time her report was read by Mrs. F. A. Elliott, chairman of the health committee. The women's collection of the First Presbyterian, the Episcopal, the First Christian, the Catholic, the South Salem Friends churches, and the Etokta club members have completed their work. The report also contained an outline of further work that will be carried on.

BANK SWINDLER FACING ARREST

Denver, Colo., Sept. 14.—(A. P.)—Federal officers will seek the arrest of Charles E. Havenor, alleged bank swindler, when he leaves the Leavenworth penitentiary, where he is serving a six-year term for defrauding the Union National bank of Beloit, Kansas, of \$24,000.

A story published September 10 stated that Havenor was serving the sentence for wrecking the First National bank of Beloit, Kansas. The Union National bank of Beloit was wrecked through Havenor's activities and the First National bank of Beloit has never had any dealings with Havenor.

Roy E. Nelson, postoffice inspector, announced that an indictment, charging a scheme to defraud five middle western banks and a number of bank investors of the region out of \$500,000, had been returned by the federal grand jury here against Havenor and that he would be arrested upon leaving the prison.
