

LEADERS IN BOTH CIRCUITS FACE HARD CONTESTS

New York, Sept. 15.—Major league clubs are enmeshed in their final inter-sectional tussle of the 1925 season today with first division teams pitted against the leaders in both circuits.

Pittsburgh regained its winning stride after taking four setbacks in a row by whacking out a 9 to 4 victory over the Robins yesterday. Vic Aldridge was masted in the box hanging up his seventh consecutive triumph.

As the Giants were speeding westward to open a series with the third place Cincinnati Reds, the victory advanced the lead of the Pirates to six and one-half games.

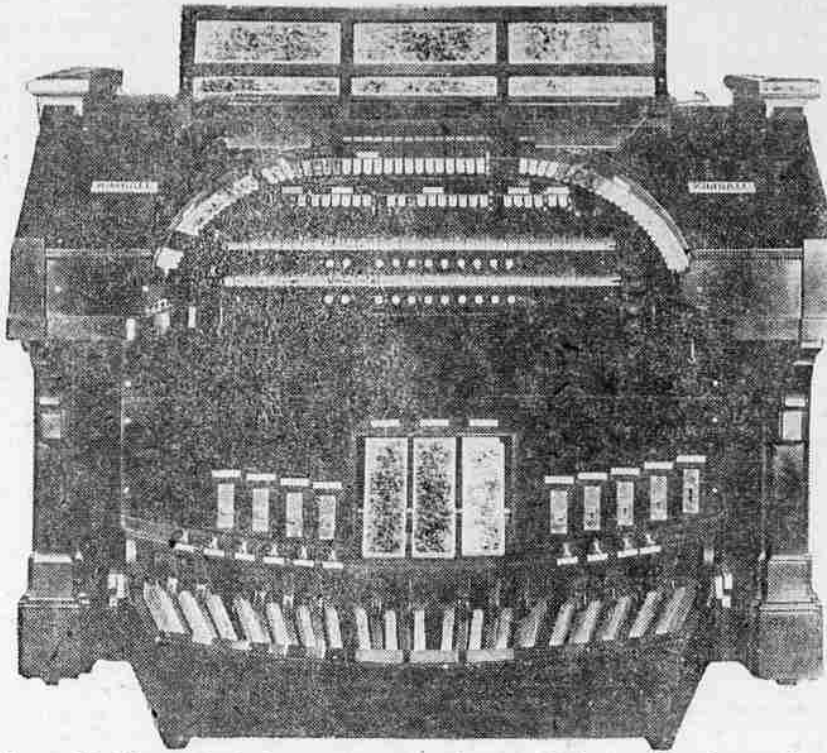
The Athletics lost ground in their forlorn pennant chase by dropping the final of a six-game series to the Yankees, 3 to 1. Sam Jones limited the Mackmen to two singles.

Although idle, the world champion Senators gained by the Athletics' defeat and their lead was stretched to eight games.

Washington had the Tigers for opponents in the opener of a series today. Since their last visit to the capital, the Bengals have become a more formidable club and are now hard of the heels of the Browns for the third place.

"Goose" Goslin, left fielder for the Griffins, was reinstated after a conference with Manager Bucky Harris and President Clarke Griffith. He was indefinitely suspended by the Washington pilot after a wordy battle during the game with the Athletics, Sunday, in which Harris brought the player to task for misplays. At the time he was fined \$100, but whether the penalty has been rescinded was not learned.

Kimball Unit Organ Feature of Equipment of Heilig Theater



The new Kimball organ, installed in the Heilig theater here by C. M. Balcom, technical engineer for the Kimball company, is said to be the last word in unification, and amount to all intents and purposes to a complete orchestra in itself. It combines every tone of the pipe organ with an unlimited variety of orchestra instruments. The organ was designed especially to fit the particular needs of the local

play house, and is adapted to its acoustic properties. This is in accordance with the set policy of the Kimball company. The organ left is high up at the right of the stage. Through a series of deflected shutters the tones of the instrument are conveyed to the stage, and from the stage the sound proceeds to the audience, making the music seem far more a part of the picture itself

than would be the case otherwise. This featuring is of particular benefit to the soloist or chorus. The Heilig theater organ gives the performer, in case of vaudeville or similar attractions, ample opportunity to synchronize with the organist. An electric control has been installed. Due to the flexibility of the expansion chambers, each solo stop

may be used in accompaniment. The organist may enter from full organ, bringing out the various shades of an overture, to a solo in which the notes of some particular instrument, such as the flute stand out. The various parts of the organ are housed in concrete, sound proof chambers to the right of the stage. The control parts of the instrument resemble generally a telephone relay frame. Hundreds of wires, running in a cable from the orchestra pit, branch out to the various parts of the instrument, including the organ pipes.

STATE TO KEEP HANDS CLEAN IN STANFIELD CASE

Governor Pierce said today that he will take no part in the prospective prosecution of Senator Stanfield, who was arrested at Baker on a charge of being drunk and disorderly, and indicated that local officers will be allowed to handle the case. The governor laughed gleefully over Stanfield's reported declaration that Pierce was back at the arrest.

William S. Levens, state prohibition commissioner, who left yesterday for Pendleton, intimated that no special prosecutor would be asked for the case. It was Levens' intention not to go to Baker until after the Pendleton Roundup.

Claims Framen.

Boise, Idaho, Sept. 15.—(A. P.)—A statement that his arrest on charges of being "drunk and disorderly" at Baker, Or., Sunday night, was a frame-up was issued by Senator Stanfield here.

"I went into the cafe for luncheon after attending to some business," Senator Stanfield said. "I had gone to the cashier to pay my bill when I was struck on the head from behind. I wheeled and struck out in self defense. I demanded to know what the trouble was and I was informed I was under arrest. I asked what for and was told for drunkenness. I was pitched onto and dragged out of the restaurant although I offered to go unaccompanied."

AGRICULTURE IS OUT OF STEP SAYS FRANK LOWDEN

Chicago, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Organization of agriculture and co-operation with business was advocated today by Frank O. Lowden, former Illinois governor, in an address on "Rural and Urban Cooperation" before the district meeting of Kiwanis clubs of eastern Iowa and Illinois here today.

"Fields, mines, factories and railroads, working together under a co-ordinated plan, make up the industrial system," he said. "The total product is largely determined by the effectiveness with which they come into gear with one another."

"Agriculture is sadly out of gear with the other parts of the structure. The main cause of this is generally conceded to be the disparity between prices of the things the farmer has to sell and the prices of those things he must buy."

"Agriculture finds itself with its millions of members freely competing among themselves while it is obliged to sell its products in a highly organized industrial and commercial world. Now if the
