MacDowell Club Plans Active Year

With the election of new officers and arrangements made for the season's concerts the MacDowell club of Salem has opened its fourth season. The club was organized in 1921 as the Women's club choral and since its beginning Mrs. W. E. Anderson has served as president. In the last election Mrs. Anderson was chosen honorary president.

Mrs. Phil Neymyer will serve as president of the club during the coming year. Other officers named are as follows: Miss Dorothy Pearce, vice president; Mrs. T. H.
