

### PORTLAND HOTEL MAN TAKES OVER LOCAL HOSTELRY

The new Salem hotel on South High street, which was built last year and has been in operation since December 14, yesterday passed from the hands of Frank Bligh and his mother, Mrs. Anna Bligh, to those of W. C. Culbertson, president proprietor of the Seward hotel in Portland. Mr. Culbertson will assume charge here immediately. The purchase includes all furniture and fixtures.

"There will be some changes made a little later," said Mr. Culbertson yesterday afternoon. "One of the things we intend to do is to improve our dining room facilities so that we may accommodate these service clubs and similar organizations that hold luncheons and dinners."

Another story will be added to the building in a few months, Mr. Culbertson indicated. Other changes may be affected.

Culbertson's home is at Canby, where he owns the Twin River farm and the Canby Herald. He is a trustee of Willamette university and has a stepson, Cornelius Bateson, on the football squad of the university at the present time.

### TWO KILLED BY BLAST IN MINE

Wheeling, W. Va., Sept. 17.—A thorough investigation into the explosion last night of 15 five-pound cans of powder in No. 2 mine of the Elm Grove Coal company at Triadelphia, 9 miles east of here, will be started today, a district mine inspector said. Two men were killed and two severely burned in the blast, but approximately 67 others who were in the mine made their way out of it uninjured.

Those killed—Rock Sande of Triadelphia, a motorman, and William Kimball of Cambridge, Ohio, a tapper—were riding an electric motor car which started from the mine entrance with 75 cans of explosives. When the car had gotten into the working to a depth of about two miles and all but 15 cans of powder had been unloaded the remainder exploded.

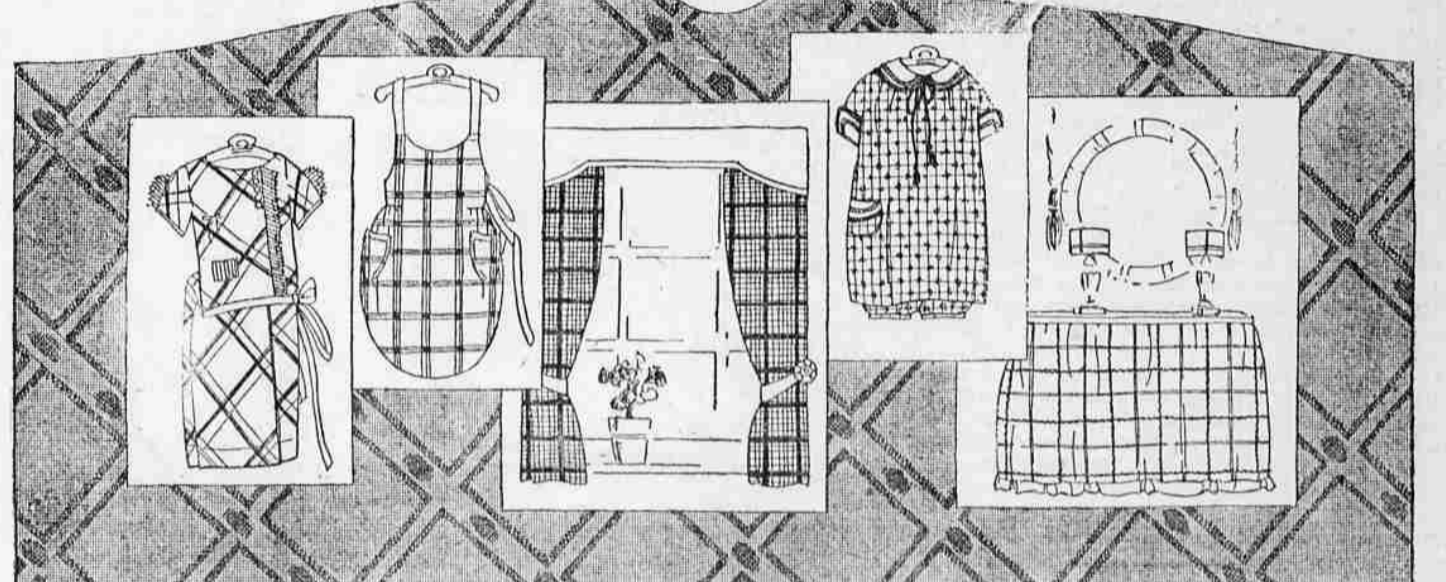
