DEAF STUDENTS SENT TO COLLEGE

Money has been raised for the transportation of four Oregon deaf students to Gallaudet college, Washington, D. C., according to announcement made by the state board of education today. The students are Blida Hargrove of Salem, Theodore Brinkley of Sherwood and Lois J. Palmer and Alice R. Campbell of Portland. Half fare has been allowed by the railroad, or \$75 for each student. For Miss Hughes, the Salem Professional and Business Women's club of Salem raised the money and for the other three the money was loaned in Portland. Under a legislative appropriation of \$100 for each of the four, \$20 a month for maintenance will be allowed each. Through error in the act the money was appropriated for tuition, but this has been allowed by the college through scholarships, and the board of control, taking a broad view of the matter, will allow the money to be used for maintenance. FARM RELIEF LEGISLATION IS UNLIKELY

(Continued from page one) agricultural conference meets at all this fall, it merely will be to draw up a final report on the investigations already made and reinforce the recommendations already submitted. It is the belief of Secretary Jardine that the period of agricultural emergency is passing. He favors legislation to foster cooperative marketing, but aside from that he feels that agriculture can work out its own problems and will be the better off for it.

COOLIDGE DOUBTFUL

That President Coolidge himself has grown more doubtful over the wisdom of reconvening his conference of experts was indicated when just before he left Swampscott, White House officials said a final decision on the point would be reached only after consulting Mr. Jardine. Now the president appears to have left the matter almost entirely up to the agricultural secretary and Robert E. Carey of Wyoming, chairman of the conference.

No preparations are being made at the agriculture department for a meeting of the conference of which Mr. Jardine himself is a member. Instead, the secretary is preparing to personally discuss the problem with representatives of various farm organizations whom he plans to call to Washington some time this fall.

President Coolidge plans to address the convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation, to be held in Chicago, December 7 to 9. He informed O. E. Bradford, president of the federation, today in a reply to an invitation that he expected to accept.

Representatives of agriculture from practically all parts of the country will be in attendance at the convention, giving the president opportunity to explain in detail his views on the farming situation.

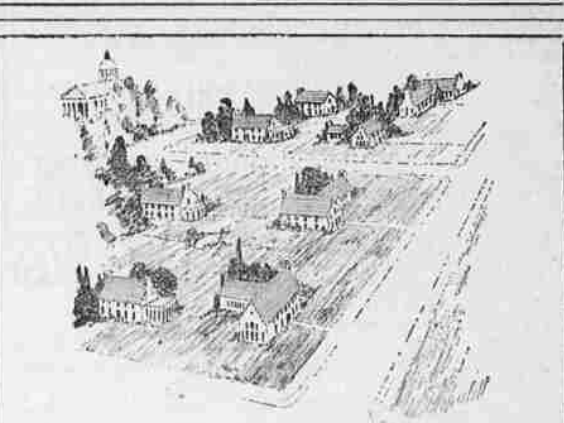
