

# ENTRIES MOUNT FOR HORSE SHOW AS FAIR NEARS

Interest grows apace in the night horse show to be held in connection with the state fair, which opens in Salem, September 28. The names on the entry list mounts satisfactorily as the days pass, and already a number of owners have arrived with their stallions to occupy their stalls in the stadium, work out in the arena and prepare in general for the nightly events.

Oswald West, one of the first comers, will lead into the ring three new horses. He is to show Princess of Manes, a high-stepper to be entered in the single and pair classes. This animal is owned by J. D. Farrell of Seattle. Both a daughter and son of Craigmore Peer, West's imported Hackney stallion will participate. McGregor Peer, a 3-year-old grey horse, was shown last year as a 2-year-old. Lady Lofly, a high-stepper, just turned two, will enter the arena for the first time in Salem. Mrs. West will appear in the ladies' classes this year.

Probably the most unique entry of the entire show will be made by the ex-governor. This will be an old-fashioned Victoria phaeton, recently purchased by Mr. West from the Lewises of Portland. It will be driven around the arena on the opening night by James Dryden of Portland, who will appear in full coachman's regalia. He will drive Harmony, Myths and Mellina, high-stepping black ponies. Later in the week the same vehicle will appear when Marie Seaton and Lady Malcolm are shown in the pair class. It is the intention of horse show officials to have well known Salem

pioneers ride in the phaeton. W. F. Turner, president of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle and Oregon Electric, is another early arrival. He is represented by two five-gaited horses, Brilliant Prince and Golden West. The Shiek, a walk-trot animal, is also owned by him. H. M. Kerron is expected to arrive shortly with eight or ten mounts. Mrs. Stanley Smith, also of Portland, will be here with Jim Noble, a jumper, Daisy Deane and Armamanut, the latter a walk-trot horse. Mrs. C. E. Grelle's well-known five-gaited horse, Shikara, will again appear before state fair horse show crowds, and three horses will come from the stable of Dr. Held of Portland. One of these is an unknown entry, is causing much speculation among horse show fans. This much is known: It is a jumper recently from the east.

Keenest interest centers upon the appearance here of the Welsh string of famous jumpers from Calgary, Canada. In addition to having this string of unbeaten jumpers, Welsh Brothers also boast of having the finest family of riders on the continent. The leader of this group, Louis Welsh, aged 15 years, will ride Barra Lad, holder of the Pacific coast jump record of 7 feet 4 1/4 inches.

## BIDS ARE CALLED FOR ON COAST HIGHWAY

Bids covering proposed construction on the Roosevelt Coast and The Dalles-California highways will be opened by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland at 10 o'clock Tuesday, September 20. Both are grading projects.

A project in Curry county calls for the grading of 7.61 miles of the north unit and 3.98 miles of the south unit of the Eucare creek-Rogue river section of the Roosevelt highway.

The project in Deschutes and Jefferson counties calls for the grading of 4.55 miles of the Crooked river section of The Dalles-California highway.
