Washington, Sept. 19.—(A. P.)—The latest scheme of newspapers to increase circulation by offering prizes for \$1 or \$2 bills bearing certain numbers was declared unlawful today by Solicitor Donnelly of the postoffice department. He ruled that the practice was a violation of the postal lottery laws and barred publications offering such prizes from the mails.

FINE LIVESTOCK TO BE FEATURED AT ANNUAL FAIR

The livestock show in connection with the state fair promises to be the greatest in history, with a much larger entry made of out-of-state livestock. One of the most notable entries of this kind has just come into the office of Mrs. Ella Schulte Wilson, and is made by George W. Mills of St. Johns, Wash. He will enter horses of the heavy draft, English shire type, these to participate also in the night horse show, in the six-horse hitch events.

A particularly large exhibit of silver foxes will be made, with prizes offered for Prince Edward Island silver and blue fox and Alaska silver and blue fox. Rabbits, which come under the rules of the pet stock division, promise to comprise a fine and comprehensive display, including as they will both the commercial and novelty breeds. Aside from

the money offered champion and grand champion ribbons will be given in a number of classes and there are many specials offered to stimulate interest. Among them will be: Silver cup given by the Oregon Rabbit Breeders' association for the best buck in the show; silver cup given by M. Graves of Portland for the best doe in the show; silver cup given by M. L. Garrison of Portland for the best pair of Flemish Giants; a pair of New Zealand rids, given by A. Hume of Portland; a novice show—best rabbit of this breed; silver trophy cup given by H. E. Geburn of Portland, for best display, points to count.

The poultry show this year will early eclipse any heretofore put on, with the division for pigeon expected to excel the exhibit of last year, when fanciers asserted it the largest one on record for the Pacific northwest. The state fair board has offered a first and second prize for the best display of three pairs each of squabs, this prize being given on any standard recognized or hybrid cross-bred untilly pigeons, all varieties or hybrids to compete together in one class for these two premiums. This award is given in order to improve and encourage the breeding of squabs for culinary and commercial purposes.
