Physical Tests For Children In Schools Will Be Compulsory

Members of the staff of the Marion county child health demonstration will act for the most part in an advisory capacity in the case of the teachers' physical inspections, which are required to be held this fall in elementary schools, according to announcement made yesterday. The inspection is required by state law enacted at the last session of the state legislature, at the instigation of State Senator F. Woodward. "The teachers' inspections have nothing to do with the examinations to be held by the staff of the county health demonstration. It is stated, "We could not possibly cover every school pupil in the county in a single year, even if we were to work nights and Sundays, and give the kind of examinations we do," said one member of the demonstration staff yesterday.

The inspection will be given by the teacher to every student in elementary schools in the county soon after school begins. It is expected to cover only such things as can be detected by an amateur in health work, such as most additional acre feet of water for the project. The estimated cost is \$90,000. The present source of water for the district are Four Mile lake, Fish lake and the natural flow of Little Butte creek. State Engineer Luper said the application doubtless would be granted.

WILLAMETTE TO OPEN NEXT WEEK NO GAIN LIKELY

With scholastic requirements for entrance attained slightly over those of last year, and tuition increased by 50 per cent, little or no increase is anticipated in attendance at Willamette university, which opens next Monday. Reports given out by school authorities indicate that attendance will go little over 350 during the year. The policy of the institution is to keep the school practically the same size for the present, gradually raising standards.

Colleges of liberal arts, law and music start simultaneously, first classes being slated for Thursday. The freshman English examination, given all students at entrance will be held Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Few registrations are anticipated until the examination is completed and the freshmen classified in their English.

Two new chairs have been added to the Willamette faculty. Miss Pauline Gabriel will have charge of all physical education work for women. Prof. Burroughs has been engaged as assistant in biology, strengthening the work of Prof. Peck, head of that department. Miss Lucille Ross will return to a position in the music school, and Robert Moulton Gaskie will take up his work in the history department, after a year's leave of absence at Washington, D. C., where he earned a Ph. D. degree in history. A local physician has been engaged for the official school doctor, and closer attention will be paid to the students' physical condition than in previous years.
