25 MILLION IS ASKED FOR AIR SERVICE

"In war the mission of the air service is: (1) As a fighting arm, in combination with the other fighting arms, to win the victory and bring about peace, as quickly, as effectively and as cheaply in lives and money as is humanly possible. (2) As a supply branch to develop and procure the equipment and supplies pertaining exclusively to the air service in such quantities as may be required for its operations.

WAR MISSION FIRST

"In considering these missions I believe one thought should always be kept in mind, that the war mission must be the predominant consideration. A policy might be adopted in any service which would enhance its development and prestige largely in peace, but would greatly lessen its effectiveness as a member of the war team. This was mission must always govern."
