

15 ANSWER CALL FOR HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM

Several men turned out for the first practice for the red and black football eleven and from all appearances the locals will have a good team although they are not expected to shine quite as well as they did last season. Only fifteen men were out in suits last night but more are expected in the next two or three days. Most of the men who were out last night were veterans of last year and the new members were unable to show up as they were busy getting their credits and assignments. The red and black eleven will be somewhat handicapped by the loss of the stellar work of Cotter Gould and Dennis Heenan, last year's quarter. Bob Dragen is claimed to be the best bet for the locale. He is able to run the team but will not be quite as clever at returning punts as Heenan. Heenan was one of the fastest men the locals have had for several years but it is hoped that a man may be developed to return punts. Phillips, a new man from the Parrish junior high school is said to be exceptionally fast and able to make good yardage. If he is able to keep up his grades he will make a good man for the locale. Other lessers will not be felt as keenly and the high school fans can rest assured that they will see some good games.

Hollis Huntington, coach for the locals is looking for a good turnout for this evening and predicts that he will have three full teams working out before the end of the week. The first few days will be devoted to limbering up exercises and getting rid of some of the extra weight gained during the summer vacation.

Jackson, captain of last year who was elected captain but later resigned, will not be back with the red and black warriors but Coach Huntington is very well pleased with the present prospects. Three new men from Newberg, eastern Washington and Montana are to be out in uniform.

The locals will open their gridiron season against West Linn on October 3. Effort is being made by Bob Kitchin for an earlier game, however, and he is in hopes of scheduling one for October 3.

YANKEE FLYERS DO BIG DAMAGE TO REBEL TRIBES

Ouezzan, Morocco, Sept. 22.—(A. P.)—Although the United States government has ruled that the American aviators who enlisted in France and now are serving under the colors of Moial Yusuf, sultan of Morocco are violating the laws of the United States, this fact apparently has not served to lower their morale.

Daily they are flying over the lines and bombing Moorish rebel towns and groups of rebels. Tons of explosives have been tossed by the members of the Sherifian squadron as the one formed by the Americans is known.

The aviators frequently fly low and use their machine guns against the Rifians. The destruction wrought by the American air men is described as very great.

In addition to the raising of villages and putting to flight bands of rebels assembled to proceed to the battle front, large numbers of farms lying north of the Ouezzan river have been destroyed together with their crops.

Colonel Charles Sweeney and Captains Sussan, Holden, Mustane, Cousins and Bullen, are mentioned as having been participants in two raids over rebel territory for which General Naulin, the French commander in chief commended them for "the splendid record of the squadron since it joined the troops at the front."

Up to yesterday the Americans had flown eighty hours in five days during which they sent down nine tons of bombs upon the rebels and fired several thousand rounds of machine gun ammunition against them.

The Americans say they feel justified in serving under the sultan, as they have taken no oath of allegiance and signed no enlistment papers. They can leave when they desire, but say they will remain.

WEEK TO DECIDE MAJOR LEAGUE PENNANT FIGHT

New York, Sept. 21.—(A. P.)—Settlement of the Major League pennant races this week is scheduled. The Pirates need only four victories out of the remaining ten games to capture the flag and the Senators five of their 12 contests.
