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## FOREST RESERVE TIMBER WORTH \$50,548 SOLD

Portland, Or., Sept. 23—Timber bringing an aggregate of \$50,548 was sold at the United States land office here late Monday. All the timber offered was sold. The Bridel Veil Timber company purchased the greater part paying \$31,317.55 for timber in Multnomah county. Other purchasers, the counties in which timber is located and amounts paid were: John J. Kennedy, Multnomah, \$5,490.96; Corvallis Logging company, Benton, \$2,895.60; Charles K. Spaulding Logging company, Polk, \$3,519.53; Fred L. Proctor, Clackamas, \$5,723.93 and E. J. Sherman, Washington, \$1,690.88.

## LAWYER TAKES JURORS HOME; CASE DISMISSED

Portland, Sept. 23—Circuit Judge Hewitt dismissed the nearly completed trial of George Helm, charged with burglary, here today, and ordered a new trial when he learned that Sam Silverman, Helm's attorney had taken two women jurors in the case to their homes in his car. Although Silverman was not in any way accused of tampering with the jurors, Judge Hewitt characterized Silverman's action as "indiscreet" and said that "our courts cannot tolerate such things." The attorney admitted, according to the judge, he had offered the two women a ride in his automobile, but denied he had discussed the case with them.
