Prominent Girl Guest Of Mrs. Miles

Mrs. B. J. Miles has as her guest her niece, Verna Cook Salomonsky, of New York city, internationally known architect. Several years ago, before her marriage to Edgar Salomonsky, Verna Cook, the daughter of Earl J. Cook of Spokane, spent more than a year in Salem in the office of the state architect. During that time she made her home with Mrs. Miles.

After leaving Salem Verna Cook went to Columbia university to complete her course. There she met and married Edgar Salomonsky, a graduate engineer of Washington and Lee university in Virginia and also a student in architecture at Columbia. They have offices together in New York city and together have won national recognition and a number of first places in national campaigns. Their home at Scarsdale, New York, built and furnished by themselves, is one of the show places of that part of the country from the architectural standpoint. Mrs. Salomonsky went to high school in Spokane and later to a Boston finishing school. Later she went abroad with her cousin, Madame Louise Llewellyn Jarocki, composer and concert singer, who was also Paris correspondent for Musical America. She studied in Paris for two years—the first year she took up interior decoration under Tudor-Hart, and the second year she enrolled in architecture in the Ecole Speciale d'Architecture. She came to Salem directly from the famous Paris school for a year of practical training. During the year spent here Mrs. Salomonsky made a number of friends who are welcoming the opportunity of being with her again.

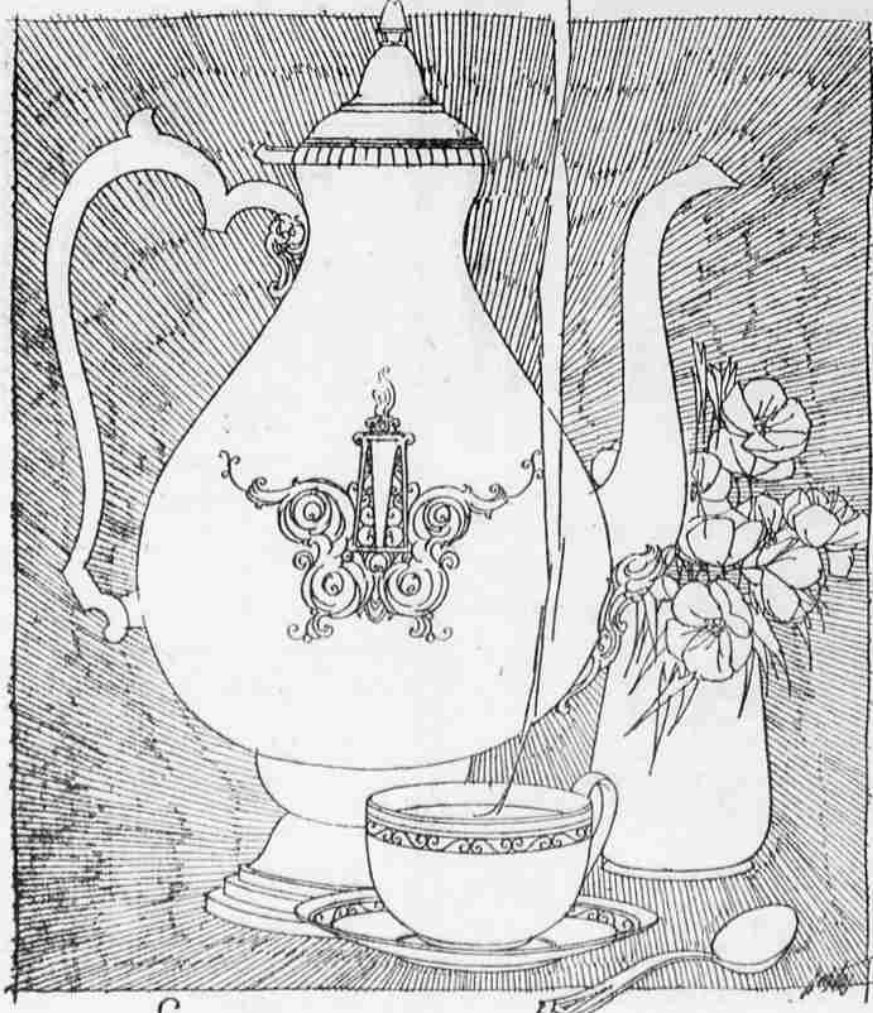
